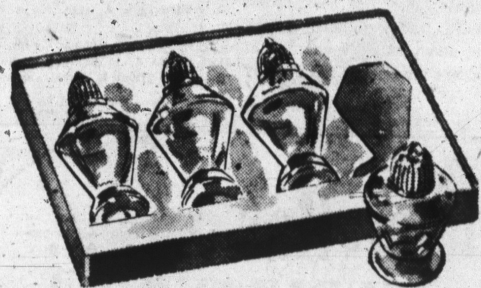

Homeless Families Take Over
London Apartment Houses

LONDON, Sept. 9 (U. P.).—Communist-organized "squatters" quietly but firmly set up housekeeping today in two fashionable London apartment houses and as Mrs. Mary Kalamakis put it: "I intend to stay, I won't get out without a fight."

The "squatters" moved in yesterday, exhibiting precise military efficiency as they took over unoccupied apartments at the exclusive Duchess of Bedford house in Kensington, and another building formerly occupied by U. S. military personnel.

Scotland Yard estimated about 1500 persons were involved. Approximately 900 settled in the various apartments.

The others left, apparently after finding there weren't enough apartments to go around. No incidents of violence were reported.

Leads Homeless Workers

Alfred Daley, a blond young man who belongs to the Kensington Communist committee, led the army of homeless workers to the buildings.

Mr. Daley said many of the homeless people had waited as long as eight years for the authorities to provide housing and that these were "the worst cases on the Communist party lists."

Alfred Victory, a former gunner with the 8th army who spent two years in a German prison camp, took over one of the apartments. He had been living with his wife and two children in one room.

"This is our first chance for decent living conditions since our marriage," he said. "The least they owe a soldier like myself is a decent place to keep a family. I intend to stay."

'Reasonable' Rents

Stan Anderson, a former prisoner of the Japanese, was elected by the "squatters" to collect "reasonable rent" from all tenants. Mr. Daley said Health Minister Aneurin Bevan would be asked to fix reasonable rates for the apartments. They are the type that rent for about \$40 a week.

The "squatter" movement was started several weeks ago by returned service men in protest against governmental red tape in the housing program.

YUGOSLAVS GET
RAIL SHIPMENT

Reveal Switch in Consignment Originally Due China.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 9.—Thousands of tons of vital steel rail specially earmarked by Gen. George C. Marshall for rebuilding China's railroads have been sent instead to Yugoslavia, UNRRA records indicated today.

The records were made public by Senator Styles Bridges (R. N. H.), who said the transfer apparently was "engineered" by a Russian and a Yugoslav who hold official UNRRA positions. He said he would demand a full investigation by the state department.

The rails were obtained for China on highest government priority at the request of Gen. Marshall, President Truman's special envoy in the negotiations to settle China's civil strife.

Re-Routing Is Ordered

However, on Aug. 7 and again on Aug. 9—the day Yugoslav fighters shot down the first of two unarmed American transport planes—UNRRA's industrial rehabilitation division ordered the greater part re-routed to Yugoslavia, the records indicated.

Mr. Bridges said "it seems ironic that while ships carrying the bodies of fliers shot down by Yugoslav planes were traversing the Atlantic in one direction, other ships were traveling in the opposite direction carrying steel for the Yugoslavs."

The records indicated 8251 tons of rail valued at \$337,348 were ordered transferred to Yugoslavia as they awaited shipment to China in U. S. warehouses.

FOUR DIE AS PLANE
CRASHES IN ALASKA

NOME, Alaska, Sept. 9 (U. P.).—Lost in blinding fog, a twin-engine freight plane crashed near here Saturday, killing three men and a woman. Operators of the McMcKinley Air-Freight Co. identified the dead as airlines vice president, Lee Chesterfield, anchorage; pilot, Mervin L. Pratt, and his wife, of Bellingham, Wash., and Co-Pilot John Campbell of Anchorage.
