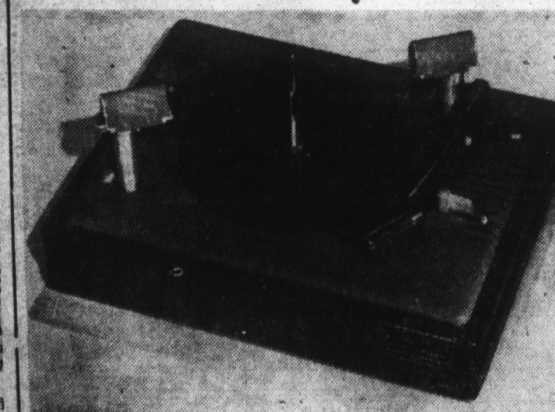

**LANDIS DENIES
MEAT 'ABOUNDS'**

Challenges Democratic Plea
It's Withheld.

Times State Service
LINTON, Ind., Oct. 2.—Rep. Ger-
ald Landis today challenged "the
great abundance of meat" claimed
by Democratic leaders.
He declared that the Indiana
New Deal is attempting to create
the impression that "plenty of meat
is available, but is being held by
selfish interests." Rep. Landis
referred to a telegram sent by state
Democratic officials, asking Presi-
dent Truman for an equitable dis-
tribution of supplies.

Scores Regulation
"In their frantic efforts to es-
cape party responsibility for the
almost complete disappearance of
meat from the dinner tables of
America, the New Deal leaders in
Indiana call upon the President
for an equitable division of the
great abundance of meat available
now," asserted Rep. Landis.
The congressman added that
"you cannot regulate the law of
supply and demand."
"You can tamper with it, as the
New Deal has, and you can get it
out of line. But, you cannot con-
trol it."

**INDIANA OPA TRYING
TO FIND NEW HOME**

Efforts are being made today to
find other quarters for the Indiana
district OPA, whose building at
415 N. Pennsylvania st. was pur-
chased recently by the Indiana
Lumbermen's Mutual Insurance Co.
While the agency's lease does not
expire until June 30, 1947, it is re-
alized that difficulty may be en-
countered in finding another location.
I. G. Saltmarsh, president, said
he hoped his insurance firm could
obtain possession "as soon as pos-
sible" upon expiration of the lease.

**FREE FOR 12 YEARS,
TRAPPED BY 'LOOKS'**
LOS ANGELES, Oct. 2 (U. P.).—
John K. Thornhill, alias John B.
Manor, who escaped 12 years ago
from a life term in Missouri state
prison, was back in jail today be-
cause a policeman "didn't like his
looks."
Thornhill, 45, told police after his
arrest last night that he was un-
der sentence for a Benton, Mo.,
murder for which an accomplice
was hanged.
During his 12 years of freedom,
he said, he had led a quiet bache-
lor's life here. He was arrested on
a downtown street corner and con-
fessed after police noticed he was
"awkward and nervous" under ques-
tioning, and checked the records.

dren, Florence, 5, and John Rebo, 6,
were found by firemen in a closet
beneath the stairway where they
apparently had gone to escape the
flames.

(U. P.).—Three convicts died in the
Connecticut electric chair last
night for the murder of a prison
guard—one of them without receiv-
ing his last request for a steak
dinner.

Arthur Tommaselli, 24, who was
executed with Raymond Lewis, 19,
and James J. McCarthy, 21, had
asked for a steak for his last meal.
The request could not be filled be-
cause of the meat shortage and
chicken was substituted.
Lewis requested link sausage. Mc-
Carthy ordered eggs.
