3 JAPS ARE SEIZED FOR KILLING FLIERS TOKYO, Oct. 3 (U. P.).—Three Japanese officers accused in the execution of U. S. fliers, and 13 other war criminal suspects have been arrested and jailed in Sugamo prison, the allied headquarters legal section announced today. One was Maj. Gen. Saburo Kawamura, charged with ordering the arrest of 7000 Chinese at Singapore. Five thousand of them were executed. Lt. Col. Seishi Adachi was

charged with executing fliers without trial. Lt. Cmdr. Hideohiro Kamikawa was accused in the deaths of two other airmen, and Capt. Kiamoto Tarita was charged with directing a party which decapitated 16 fliers, three of whom he beheaded personally.
