

Showdown Near For Army, Michigan

Cadets' Winning Streak At Stake Saturday; Favorites Roll Unchecked on Grid Road

NEW YORK, Oct. 7.—Spread out behind Coach Dana Bible's Texas Tornado, all the well-heeled sectional football favorites rolled along among the undefeated today but the inevitable showdown was approaching for Army and Michigan.

They'll clash at Ann Arbor Saturday and Army's precious winning streak, now 21 games, is in critical danger for the first time in three years.

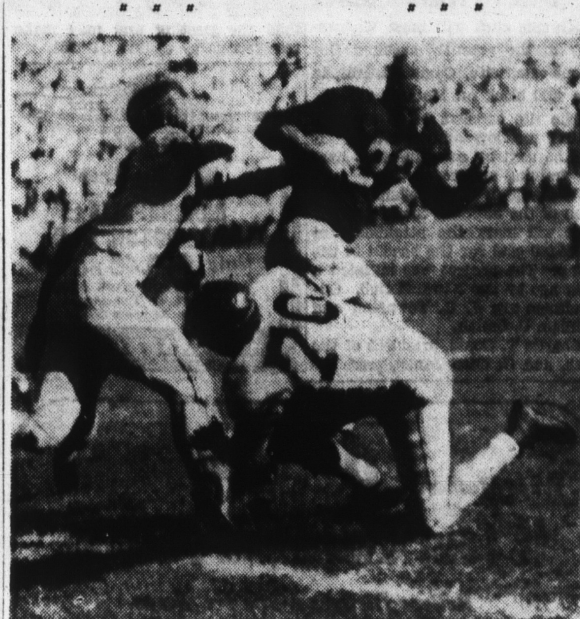
Scoring heavily in the statistics if not on the scoreboard, Michigan won its second straight game by defeating Iowa, 14 to 7, while Army was facing Cornell, 46 to 21, with liberal use of reserves who proved more than mildly disappointing. Cornell held Cadet reserves even and it was a four-touchdown spurt by Glenn Davis that made the difference.

Alabama had a tight squeeze with South Carolina, 14 to 6, and Notre Dame's running attack was unimpressive as Johnny Lujack passed the Irish to a 33-to-0 victory over Pittsburgh, but down in Texas the rip-roaring Longhorns required no excuse as they walloped a first-rate Oklahoma A. & M. eleven, 54 to 6, bringing to an end a victory string started late in 1944 though tied last week by Arkansas. U. C. L. A., the West coast powerhouse, whipped Washington, 39 to 13.

Favored Heavily
With a terrific scoring average of over 57 points per game engineered by Bobby Layne, Tom Landry and a tightly-knit line, Texas was a heavy favorite to sweep its Southwest conference schedule. Oklahoma, last minute victor over Texas A. & M., with a field goal, 10 to 7, meets Texas this week. Purdue, beaten by Illinois, 43 to 7, plays at Notre Dame, Southwest, while Alabama and Stanford meets U. C. L. A. in other contests involving sectional leaders.

Navy Upset
Columbia's 23-to-14 upset of Navy put the week's eastern feature in the Yale bowl where Columbia will put Coach Howie Odell's offensive minded Yale Bulldogs to their first test. Yale's second half rally, after a 6 to 6 first half, dumped Colgate, 27 to 6.

In the Big Nine, Indiana and Northwestern joined Michigan and Illinois in the victory column, both with unexpected ease. Indiana's two-beaten, defending champions defeated Minnesota, 21 to 0, and Northwestern turned back highly-

If History Counts, Only Four Big 9 Title Eligibles Remain

CHICAGO, Oct. 7.—If history means anything the Western conference football race today narrowed to four contenders—the only teams unbeaten in Big Nine competition.

The titles in the Western conference usually go to a perfect record team. Fifteen times in the last 20 seasons it has been necessary to go through the league schedule undefeated to gather the championship laurels. Reckoned from that standard the title chase now is reduced to a battle among Michigan, Northwestern, Illinois and Ohio State.

Michigan currently leads the conference parade with two straight victories. Northwestern and Illinois each have won a single contest, while Ohio State has yet to inaugurate its league season. The other five members already have been beaten.

Michigan to the Front

Michigan stepped to the front of the parade Saturday when it downed Iowa, 14 to 7, in the day's headline game.

In other conference contests Illinois trounced Purdue, 43 to 7; Northwestern trimmed Wisconsin, 28 to 0, and Indiana broke into the victory column by downing Minnesota, 21 to 0.

Northwestern sounded a warning it may cause trouble by its impressive showing in topping Wisconsin. Vic Schwall and Frank Aschenbrenner led Northwestern's well balanced attack. Schwall scored the first two touchdowns and averaged seven yards an attempt on his 13 rushes.

The defending champion, Indiana, proved it intends to make a fight before surrendering the crown. The Hoosiers piled up 22 first downs to only four for the Gophers.

roles were two freshmen backs, dusky Orville Williams, late of Crispus Attucks and Jim McLinn of last year's Cathedral city champs.

Only about 25 seconds of the game remained when McLinn heaved a spot pass to Williams from his own 45. Orville took it amid a couple of would-be Sycamore defenders on the Indiana State 30. He cut to his right like a scared rabbit, ducked two tacklers and scampered across the goal for the winning points. McLinn
