Accused Swindler Says U. S. Tricked Him Into FBI Custody

MIAMI, Fla., Oct. 7.—Antonio Navarro Fernandez, accused of being an international swindler, says that Uncle Sam rigged a little international game of his own to give the extradition laws a run-around. Fernandez is in the hands of the FBI here in default of \$100,000 bond.

Fernandez charges flatly that the United States connived with the Dutch West Indies government to shanghai him from Curacao, Netherlands West Indies, to Miami. He says he thought he was going to Curacao, Trujillo in the Dominican Republic, but, after the plane was

miles out over the Caribbean, he learned he was bound for Miami. He was arrested by the FBI when the plane landed in Miami, and if he ever had a ticket from Curacao to Miami—which he denies—he says the FBI must have it. The only ticket Fernandez produces is one he paid \$75 for in Caracas, entitling him to passage from the Venezuelan airport of La Guaira to Ciudad Trujillo, with a stopover in Curacao.

Fernandez is accused of swindling M. O. Dunning, Washington, D. C., lawyer, and Sigmund J. Jones, Colombian and Curacao officials got together and shipped him to Miami so he could be arrested.

Officials are keeping silent on this, but authentic sources in Curacao have informed me that when Fernandez arrived there from Curacao, the crew refused to let him get off the plane.

These sources also say that a ticket was issued for Fernandez, calling for his transportation from Curacao to Miami, but that Fernandez never bought this ticket nor received it. The ticket was issued on orders from the Netherlands West Indies government immigration department, these sources declare.

Fernandez says all this adds up to collusion between governments to put him in the hands of the law. Incidentally, he also denies being a swindler, and says he hired Mr. Dunning to get him into the United States legally and promised a fee of \$125,000.

Served 4-Year Term
Fernandez has twice been deported from the United States. The first time was in 1929 when, he tells me, he paid "someone" \$500 to smuggle him across the border from Mexico. He was caught and served four years on McNeil island, he says, and then was deported.

The second time Fernandez came into the states in 1938, on his Spanish passport, for a 90-day stay. At the end of that time he asked for a six-months' extension. His record caught up with him and he was deported again.

Fernandez, whose Spanish passport is good only for the western hemisphere, is barred by the Franco government because he is a Spanish republican in exile. Fernandez says that during the Spanish civil war he bought munitions in Canada for the loyalists, and made \$720,000—of which he claims to have \$450,000 left.

AUTO EMPLOYMENT
AT ALL-TIME HIGH
DETROIT, Oct. 7 (U. P.)—Automobile Facts, monthly publication of the Automotive Manufacturers association, said today that employment and dollar payrolls in the auto industry have reached an all-time high for peacetime operations.

The trade paper cited figures from the U. S. bureau of labor statistics indicating that auto, body and parts plants are paying out \$36,000,000 weekly to 629,000 hourly workers, an increase of 76 per cent in dollar payments and 25 per cent in number of workers over January, 1941.

Henry Soderberg, Swedish Y. M. C. A. secretary, who ministered to 50,000 American and British prisoners in Germany during the war, will visit Indianapolis Oct. 21.

Members of Y. M. C. A. Barbed Wire club, composed of ex-servicemen who were prisoners of war, will hear Mr. Soderberg at a dinner given by Wm. H. Block Co., in the store tearoom in the evening.

Mr. Soderberg is visiting America through the auspices of the International Y. M. C. A. committee.
