**Accused Swindler Says U. S. Tricked Him Into FBI Custody**

MIAMI, Fla., Oct. 7.—Antonio Navarro Fernandez, accused of being an international swindler, says that Uncle Sam rigged a little international game of his own to give the extradition laws a run-around. Fernandez is in the hands of the FBI here in default of \$100,000 bond.

Fernandez charges flatly that the United States connived with the Dutch West Indies government to smuggle him from Curacao, Netherlands West Indies, to Miami. He says he thought he was going to Ciudad Trujillo in the Dominican Republic, but, after the plane was

miles out over the Caribbean, he learned he was bound for Miami. He was arrested by the FBI when the plane landed in Miami, and if he ever had a ticket from Curacao to Miami—which he denies—he says the FBI must have it. The only ticket Fernandez produces is one he paid \$75 for in Caracas, entitling him to passage from the Venezuelan airport of La Guardia to Ciudad Trujillo, with a stopover in Curacao.

Fernandez is accused of swindling

M. O. Dunning, Washington, D. C. lawyer, and Sigmund Janas, Colonial Airlines president, of \$125,000.

A hearing has been scheduled

Wednesday in an endeavor to take him to the jurisdiction of the New York southern district federal court to face that accusation. So far, according to his attorney, Al Hubbard, no warrant has reached Miami.

Fernandez tells a weird story

which involves airlines employees

and consular representatives of several countries. Parts of his story are documented by the papers he still has in his possession, such as his Spanish passport, the ticket he bought in Caracas, and a report stamped with the seal of the Colombian consulate in Curacao.

These sources say that a ticket was issued for Fernandez

calling for his transportation from Curacao to Miami, but that Fernandez neither bought this ticket nor received it. The ticket was issued on orders from the Netherlands West Indies government immigration department, these sources declare.

Fernandez says all this adds up to collusion between governments to put him in the hands of the law.

Incidentally, he also denies being a swindler, and says he hired Mr. Dunning to get him into the United States legally and promised a fee of \$125,000.

Served 4-Year Term

Fernandez has twice been deported from the United States. The first time was in 1929 when, he tells me, he paid "someone" \$500 to smuggle him across the border from Mexico. He was caught and served four years on McNeil Island, he says, and then was deported.

The second time Fernandez came

into the states in 1938, on his Spanish passport, for a 90-day stay.

At the end of that time he asked for a six-months' extension. His record caught up with him and he was deported again.

Fernandez, whose Spanish pass-

port is good only for the western

hemisphere, is barred by the Franco

government because he is a Spanish

republican in exile. Fernandez

says that during the Spanish civil

war he bought munitions in Canada

for the loyalists, and made \$720,000—of which he claims to have

\$450,000 left.

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
