Meatless Meals— Replace Meat With Noodles

Vigorous fall appetites demand hearty meals and the wise housewife knows that noodles are a protein stretcher in this time of meat shortage.

An all-in-one dinner saves time, too, and with the addition of other nutritious vegetables the answer to a delicious meal is easy.

NOODLE SURPRISE CASSEROLE

1 tbsp. salt
3 qts. boiling water
4 oz. noodles
1 c. whole kernel corn
1 c. cooked peas
½ c. mushrooms
½ c. chopped green pepper
2 tps. salt
1½ c. cream or evaporated milk.

Add salt to boiling water and bring to rapid boil. Add noodles gradually and let boil until noodles are tender, about five minutes. Drain and rinse noodles.

Combine corn, peas, mushrooms and green pepper. Fold in noodles. Add salt to cream or milk and add to noodle mixture. Pour into greased 1½-quart casserole. Bake in moderate oven (350 degrees F.) about 30 minutes. Serves four.

If you have same chicken left over, add one cup of cut-up chicken to the recipe.

Let's Eat Or Meta Given

A FISH dish is as good as the ingredients that go into it and the care given in its preparation. Fresh fish of fine texture and flavor is the first requisite.

It should be prepared in a short time after it is purchased because it is so perishable. For the creole in today's paper, we suggest using fillets or steaks of white fish, pike, halibut or trout.

FISH CREOLE

(For Tuesday Dinner)

¼ c. butter
2 tps. chopped onion
½ c. chopped celery
2 tps. chopped green pepper
3 med. tomatoes, sliced
¼ c. sliced okra
¼ c. water
1 bay leaf
1 lb. fish fillets or steaks
½ tsp. salt, or to suit taste

Melt butter in skillet, add onion, celery and green pepper and simmer about five minutes, stirring frequently. Add tomatoes, okra and water, then bayleaf and fish. Sprinkle with salt, cover and simmer about 15 minutes. Serve hot with mashed or baked potatoes or boiled rice.

Serves four.

CHEESE SOUP

(For Wednesday Luncheon)

1½ tps. margarine
1 small onion, chopped fine
1 branch celery, chopped very fine
1½ tps. flour
¼ tsp. salt
Pepper
1½ qts. milk
3 oz. cheese (¾ c. grated)

1 tsp. chopped parsley
Melt margarine in a saucepan and add onion and celery and saute until onion is transparent, then blend in the flour, salt and pepper thoroughly and stir in the milk gradually, stirring constantly to keep smooth.

Continue to stir and cook over low heat until mixture thickens slightly and bubbles. Now place over simmering water, add the cheese and stir until it is melted. Serve immediately with chopped parsley sprinkled over the top.

Serves four.
