

Church News— Baptists Plan To Meet at South Bend

200 Are Scheduled
To Attend From Here

Approximately 200 laymen and ministers of this community are expected to attend the 113th session of the Indiana Baptist convention Monday through Wednesday in South Bend.

Dr. J. M. Horton of Indianapolis, executive secretary of the convention, will be in charge, and Prof. L. George Blake of Franklin college will preside as convention president.

Chief action of the convention is planned to deal with the campaign for \$1,000,000 for rehabilitation and construction on the mission field. A report of the active campaign in Indianapolis to raise a quota of \$200,000 will be given Monday night. Dr. Luther Wesley Smith of Philadelphia will speak.

Indianapolis persons on the program include Dr. Herbert F. Thurston, president of Baptist Men, Inc.; Dr. Clive McGuire, executive secretary of the Indianapolis Baptist association and Brunson Motley, visual aids specialist. Other speakers are Alva C. Waggoner of Pendleton; the Rev. William Allan, Indiana director of the World Mission crusade, and President William Gear Spencer of Franklin college.

Baptist pastors will hold a conference Monday afternoon with the Rev. Joseph L. Hughes of Indianapolis in charge of music. The Women's Baptist Mission Society of Indiana will meet Tuesday morning with Mrs. W. H. Dillard of North Vernon presiding.

Bishop Velichky Andrey of New York, episcopal head of the Macedonian-Bulgarian Eastern Orthodox Churches of North and South America, will conduct services and be entertained over the week-end in Indianapolis.

The prelate has just returned from a six-month visit to Constantinople. He will officiate at services, assisted by the Rev. George Nicoloff of Detroit, tomorrow at 9 a. m. at the St. Stephen church, 226 Blackford st.

The local church board and its chairman, Theodore Vasiloff, will be hosts at a banquet honoring the bishop tomorrow at 7 p. m. in the new Slovenian hall, 10th and Warren sts.

St. Stephen's congregation has purchased ground at 16th and Medford sts. as a site for a new national home and church. The present Blackford st. edifice was built in 1915 and ever since has been a center of religious activities.

Retired Bishop To Speak Here

Bishop Francis J. McConnell, retired bishop of the Methodist church, will give the sermon tomorrow at 10:30 a. m. at the homecoming marking the 125th anniversary in the Roberts Park Methodist church.

The church and its pastor are concluding the anniversary year with a series of festive events. The last feature on the program will be the historical pageant written and directed by Mrs. Gladys McCollin. Oct. 20 at 7:45 p. m. in the church.

The church is distributing among its members and friends a souvenir booklet in which is recorded the history of the congregation and Methodistism.

Bishop McConnell, a dean of Methodists, is called the "greatest liberal of the denomination." He is a former president of DePauw university and of the Federal Council of Churches. He lived in Indianapolis as a boy when his father was pastor of the church. The father, the Rev. I. H. McConnell, was Roberts Park minister from 1884 to 1887.

School Plans Are Outlined

266 Week-Day Classes
To Be Held This Year

The Protestant week-day religious classes for public school children will be described in churches and Sunday schools tomorrow.

Talks on the week-day classes will mark Week-Day Religious Education Sunday.

A total of 266 classes are scheduled in Indianapolis and the county. They will be conducted on a staggered basis and taught by 10 full-time and three part-time teachers, according to the Rev. Floriz A. Pfeiffer, administrative director.

Provide Transportation

Last semester, 74 denominations were represented in the classes, which included 90 per cent of the fourth grade children.

Children attending 13 schools that are a mile or more from the nearest church, with adequate facilities for conducting the classes, will be transported to religious education centers.

The local P. T. A. of the schools have attended to the enrollment. Parents must sign cards requesting the principal to release their children for the classes.

The fourth grade course of study is on "The Life of Christ" and the fifth grade on "Old Testament Heroes and Peoples." The Bible is used as textbook in all classes.

Archbishop Schulte Is Given Reception at Cathedral High

The new archbishop of Indianapolis last night pledged himself "to help make Indiana an even better state than Kansas and possibly better than Missouri."

Kansas and Missouri were the scene of the entire priestly career of the Most Rev. Paul C. Schulte until he was installed archbishop of Indianapolis Thursday.

Last night, the mayor, the governor and various representatives of persons officially welcomed the archbishop at a civic reception in Cathedral high school.

In his response Archbishop Schulte made several humorous remarks, but a serious appeal for respect for the other fellow's religious views. "As soon as we can give one another credit for sincerity, we have a very solid basis for living together with harmony," he said.

He promised in matters of public welfare to collaborate to the fullest. He stressed the point that the Constitution grants to every citizen privilege of freedom of worship, and he expressed satisfaction in seeing Catholic and non-Catholic living harmoniously together in Indiana.

Archbishop Schulte was moved by the warm-hearted welcome given him by Hoosier folk.

Clarence Sweeney, who served as chairman, recalled, humorously, that Indianapolis had sent many persons to Leavenworth without much recognition from there. "But when Leavenworth decided to act, she returned good for evil," he said.

Mayor Tyndall spoke of the double satisfaction for the city in the promotion of the Most Rev. Joseph E. Ritter to the See of St. Louis, as well as the appointment of Archbishop Schulte to this archdiocese. Governor Gates referred to the heritage of the Catholic church in Indiana in his greeting to the archbishop.

The Very Rev. Msgr. Pinton G. Walker, Terre Haute, indicated the relationship of St. Louis and the Indianapolis archdiocese, citing the religious history of the northwest territory.

"The Laymen's View" was outlined by John C. Ruckelshaus, an instrumental ensemble from the personnel of the Indianapolis Symphony—orchestra played several numbers with Walter Reauleux conducting. The archdiocesan male chorus sang under the direction of Elmer A. Steffen, K. S. G. Edward F. Krieger served as organist.
