Mrs. Winter returned to her farm home after being absolved Thursday of charge of murdering her 3-year-old great grandson June 15 by feeding him arsenic.





## Nation's Best Mathematical Minds Meet at Unique College

PRINCETON, N. J., Oct. 14.—A group of men with some of the best mathematical minds in the world are pooling their mental resources on a unique, picturesque college campus here to find new discoveries in science.

They are "students" at college where there is no football team, no examinations, no diplomas, no degrees.

Each already holds a doctor's degree or is a mature scholar. That is the rule for entrance at the institute for advanced study, headed by

Dr. Frank Aydelotte, widely known for the most part as an informal lecturer or discussions.

The institute, which erroneously has been described as part of Princeton University, is located just outside the limits of this historic town and atop one of several rolling hills dotting its campus.

Such mathematical wizards as James Waddell Alexander, Albert Einstein, Marston Morse, Wolfgang Pauli, Carl L. Siegel, Oswald Veblen, John Von Neumann and Hermann Weyl are professors at the institute.

Their "students" come from all parts of the world. Ideas and theories are exchanged during "classes" in science.

what makes the planets follow a particular course.

Mr. Morse has returned to his work here after serving with the war department during the war. He was cited for his "original studies in terminal ballistics, bomb fragmentation, clearance of mine fields, and ricochet."

Specifically, Mr. Morse predicted on the basis of data he compiled the best height for shells to explode, and his advance calculations made use of the proximity fuse a possibility.

Now, Mr. Morse is working on a new theory. He wants to determine

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
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
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
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
