FAIRFIELD, Ill., Oct. 13 (U. P.).—State's Attorney, Virgil W. Mills said today he would not seek indictments against Mr. Lillie Winter, 76, in connection with the deaths of her sister and brother, in whose bodies traces of arsenic were found. Mrs. Winter returned to her farm home after being absolved Thursday of charges of murdering her 3-year-old grandson June 15 by feeding him arsenic.

**Nation's Best Mathematical Minds Meet at Unique College**

PRINCETON, N. J., Oct. 14—A group of men with some of the best mathematical minds in the world are pooling their mental resources on a unique, picturesque college campus here to find new discoveries in science.

Dr. Frank Aydelotte, widely known educator, which for the most part are informal lectures or discussions. The institute, which erroneously has been described as part of Princeton university, is located just outside the limits of this historic town and atop one of several rolling hills dotting its campus.

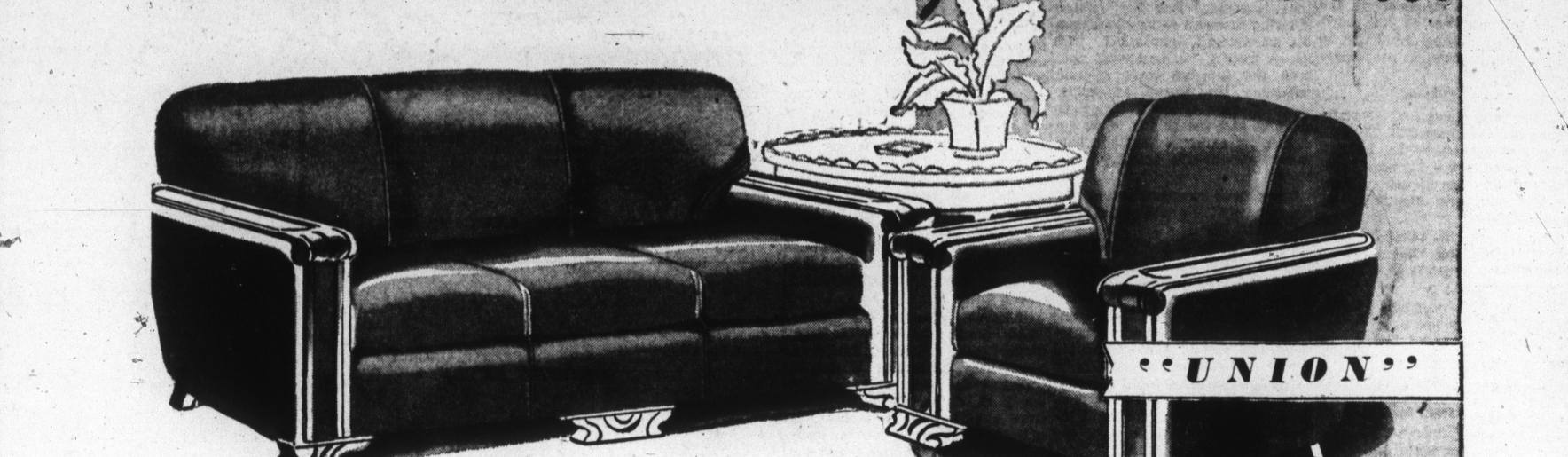
Such mathematical wizards as James Wadell Alexander, Albert Einstein, Marston Morse, Wolfgang Pauli, Carl L. Siegel, Oswald Veblen, John Von Neumann and Hermann Weyl are professors at the institute. Their "students" come from all parts of the world. Ideas and theories are exchanged during "classes."

Mr. Morse has returned to his work here after serving with the war department during the war. He was cited for his "original studies in terminal ballistics, bomb fragmentation, clearance of mine fields, and ricochet."

A veteran student in theories of equilibrium, he said that it has been determined that planets follow some orbits, or courses, easier than others. There must be a reason, he explains, and this is what he hopes to determine.

He sees great scientific advances as the result of the high speed electronic computer, a new, refined model of which is being constructed for the institute. He said the new computer may revolutionize weather forecasting, taking out a lot of the "guess work."

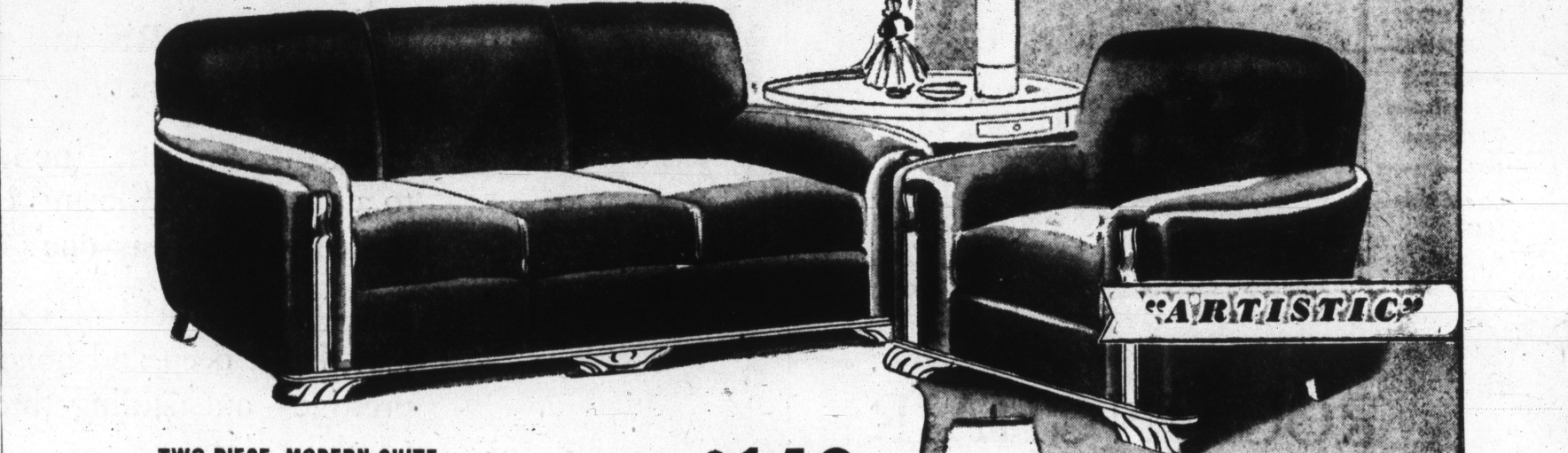
