## 11 TRAFFIC PLAN CHANGES URGED

Joint City-State Committee Suggests Move.

Eleven steps were recommended today to modernize the city's traffic plan.

They were suggested by a joint city-state traffic committee headed by City Engineer Thomas R. Jacobi.

The recommendations are:

ONE: Enforce the double-parking ban, with no "fixing" of stickers. Illegally-parked cars to be towed to the garage.

TWO: Increase of no-parking periods on major streets to 6 to 9 a. m. and 3 to 6 p. m.

THREE: Designate two downtown loops, each with one-way traffic at all times. A clockwise loop would be formed by Ohio, Delaware and Georgia sts. and Capitol ave. A counter-clockwise loop would be formed by Vermont, Maryland and Alabama sts. and Senate ave.

Would Re-route Car Lines

FOUR: Re-route eight streetcar lines. Consider mid-block stops in the downtown area and on the far side of intersections outside the mile square.

FIVE: Accelerate the city plan commission-works board plan to provide off-street parking facilities in the mile square for at least 5000 cars.

SIX: Prohibit truck loading and unloading at the curb in the downtown area, except between 6 and 9 a. m. and 3 and 6 p. m., using alleys whenever possible.

SEVEN: Approve immediately the purchase of 2000 parking meters for mile-square installation. The authorizing measure is pending before the city council.

EIGHT: Eliminate left turns on Meridian, Delaware, Pennsylvania and Illinois sts. and Capitol ave. between Washington st. and Fall Creek blvd., during the morning and evening restricted parking hours.

Consider Street Widening

NINE: Ban parking during the restricted periods on other streets, yet to be determined. These might include all north-south streets between Alabama st. and Capitol ave. and east-west streets between Michigan and Maryland sts. except Washington st.

TEN: Continue city-state cooperation of an "aggressive" program of grade separation, street widening, resurfacing and illumination.

ELEVEN: Speed up traffic signal modernization and synchronization.

These recommendations will be considered by city councilmen, other municipal officials and the state highway commission. Action by these agencies is necessary before any of the suggestions can be placed in operation.
