Republicans Have Edge of 29 in House.

ate contests, the three seats having been held also by Democrats in the 79th congress.

The contests are between Herbert R. O'Connor, Democrat, and D. John Markey, Republican, in Maryland; Senator Dennis Chavez, Democrat, and former Republican Secretary of War Patrick J. Hurley, in New Mexico; and Senator Harley M. Kilgore, Democrat, and Thomas Sweeney, Republican, in West Virginia.

The undecided house contest is in Utah, where Walter K. Granger, Democratic incumbent, is opposed by David J. Wilson, Republican. Mr. Wilson has a very slight lead and may possibly give the Republicans another seat.

House Majority Is 29

These undetermined contests would not change the election results either way. The Republicans have gained 13 senate seats for a minimum majority of three. They roomed from 192 in the old house to 246 in the new, for a majority of 29.

Bills and vetoes are likely to fly during the next two years between those Republican majorities and the White House. The bitterest battles of the last two years of the Wilson administration were fought on foreign relations—on the effort of the world war I President to take the United States into the League of Nations. A Republican senate beat the league and the treaty of Versailles.

This time the United States has a considerable measure of bi-partisan foreign policy. Responsible and powerful Republicans are pledged to support it but there also is a strong G. O. P. element in opposition.

Vandenberg Has Important Role

Senator Arthur H. Vandenberg (R, Mich.) has been one of the architects of United States foreign policy, especially in its later patient-but-firm with Russia developments. Senator Vandenberg is in line to be the new chairman of the senate foreign relations committee. He would succeed Senator Tom Connally (D, Tex.), with whom he has served at meetings of the United Nations and the preliminary Paris peace conference.

the Democratic standard bearer in the senate contest sent every Republican candidate for state office to victory, and returned the nine-to-

two margin held by Republicans in the state's congressional delegation. Although nominally the G. O. P. congressional margin remained as it was before, with all incumbents who sought re-election returning to their seats, the Republican voting strength in congress will be enhanced to the extent of one vote. In the eighth district, where Edward Mitchell of Evansville upset his fellow townsman, Winfield Denton, the outcome was interpreted as improving the G. O. P. position.

Liberal Views

In that district incumbent Charles LaFollette, although nominally a

Republican, has always voted more Democratic than G. O. P. in congress, primarily because of his "liberal" views toward labor. Because he was a labor candidate and because the district is normally Democratic, it was expected Mr. Denton would win the congressional seat. Since he did not, however, G. O. P. leaders felt they had substituted a controllable Republican for a "renegade" Republican and would be able to turn in their full nine votes when the chips were down on a controversial issue.

In Marion county, one of the congressional races watched with

particular interest, Rep. Louis Ludlow, a Democrat, beat back a Republican tide to beat his Republican opponent by nearly 4000 votes. Mr. Ludlow returns to congress from an otherwise Republican district for the 10th time. Even in the big cities, normally the mainstay of Democratic support, the Republican tide ran heavily. Only in Lake county, did the city vote run relatively true to the usual Democratic form. In Terre Haute the vote was close, but Indianapolis, South Bend, Anderson, Evansville, Ft. Wayne and Muncie went Republican.
