STATE POLICE AT FULL STRENGTH

120 Troopers Return From Military Service.

With the recent return of 120 men from the service the state police department is at its pre-war level.

Last two men to resume their duties were Troopers William Kirkham, Indianapolis, former army intelligence investigator, and Donald J. Weber, Petersburg, ex-army lieutenant in military government. They rejoined the state police Nov. 1.

Col. Austin Killian, state police superintendent, said only one of the department's employees lost his life in the war. Rex F. Barwick, Judyville 26-year-old B-17 pilot, was reported missing over Germany in April, 1944.

Mr. Barwick was a trooper at the Lafayette post. He was appointed to the state police in 1941 and had patrolled in Benton county until he entered the service in February, 1943. He attended Purdue university.

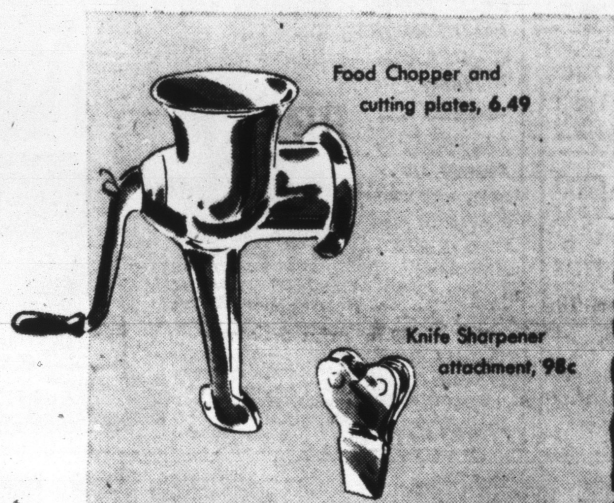

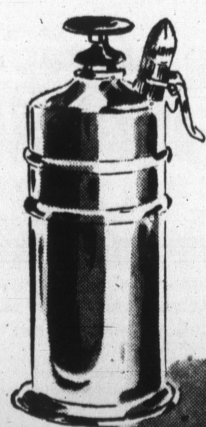
