Abraham Goldberg, founder and president of the Goldberg Cooperage Co., 315 W. Morris st., died yesterday in his home, 3945 N. New Jersey st. after a short illness. He was 70.

Mr. Goldberg, who founded the cooperage firm about 55 years ago, was born in Russia and had lived here 59 years. He was a founder and past president of Beth-El temple, member of the Beth-El Men's club, Zionist organization, B'nai B'rith and Indiana Chamber of Commerce.


### COX RITES TODAY AT BLOOMINGTON

William A. Boyce, who once was driven with his family from Booneville, Mo., because his father voted for Abraham Lincoln, died Saturday in his home, 317 E. 12th st., at age 94.

Private services will be held at 10:30 a. m. tomorrow in the Montgomery Funeral home. Burial will be in Washington Park cemetery.

Mr. Boyce could remember when his family, which had moved to Missouri from Milwaukee, Wis., were driven from their home on a night in 1861. They traveled by mule and wagon to St. Louis.

He was employed in glass bottle factories in Washington, Pennsylvania, and Gas City, Ind., before retiring. He had lived here since 1913.

## William E. Reiley Services Set for Tomorrow, 8:30 A. M.

Mr. Reiley died Saturday of injuries received when he fell down the basement stairs of the Cozy restaurant, 115 E. Wabash st., after listening to the Notre Dame-Army football game.

An attorney for Keith's theater, Mr. Reiley apparently lost his footing while going to the washroom in the basement of the restaurant and plunged down the stairs, striking his head on the floor.

He was pronounced dead a few minutes later in the admitting room of City hospital. Dr. Roy B. Storts, county coroner, said death was accidental due to a fractured skull.

Mrs. Reiley, who was 63, had been a candidate for the Republican nomination for Marion county prosecutor and had his law office at 108 E. Washington st.

Active in Republican politics he had served as seventh district committeeman for the party in 1920s and later was an attorney for Will Hays' movie office in Hollywood, Calif.

Born in New York state, he moved to Muncie with his parents when a child and graduated from Muncie High School and attended Notre Dame University. He transferred to Indiana University and received his law degree from the Indiana University Law school.

Mr. Reiley was admitted to the bar in 1910 and began his practice in the office of Kealing Hugg. Prior to attending law school he had worked as a reporter on several newspapers in the state.

A veteran of World War I, he was a member of the Veterans of Foreign Wars and Phi Kappa Psi fraternity.
