41st Annual Men's City Pin Tourney Opens Tomorrow

The 41st annual men's city bowling tournament opens tomorrow with the initial day's activity confined to team events at Dezelan's alleys.

Competition in the doubles and singles gets under way Sunday at the Indiana alleys. The first squad of the 41st aggregations entered in the five-man competition faces the maples at 6:30 p. m. tomorrow.

The first competitors of the doubles entrants, who number 632, and the initial shift of the 1110 entrants in the singles event, open fire on the pins at 11 a. m. Sunday. Play in the team events will be resumed Sunday at 10:30 a. m.

The team events, which are in charge of Oscar Behrens, city association secretary, will be concluded on Jan. 5, while the minor events, supervised by Francis Raftery, will wind up one week earlier, on Jan. 29.

Entrants in this season's meet, moved up from the usual spring dates to the present schedule because of conflict with the state tournament, which is slated on local alleys during March and April, will be firing at a record prize fund. Although entries fell below last year's total, advance in entry fees built the cash awards to a new high.

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'Line Drive' by Eddie Bush Handcuffs Goalie Almas and Flyers Gain a 3-3 Deadlock

The Indianapolis Caps last night were the victims of a line drive. They weren't playing baseball but the guess is that Eddie Bush, St. Louis Flyers' big defenseman, thought he was on a diamond instead of on hockey ice.

In the third and final period at the Coliseum last night, in a close contest played before 6188 fans and the far out at mid-ice and the drive had so much on it that the blazing puck handcuffed Cap Goalie Red Almas, tore through his glove and dropped into the cage for the tying score at 3-3.

Bush's goal was registered at 18:12, just 1 minute 48 seconds before curtains. It upset the Caps and the fans no end but was a tribute to the staying qualities of the St. Louis club.

Flyers Keep Plugging
As a matter of fact, the Flyers played their hockey like the St. Louis Cardinals play baseball, at least it was that way last night despite the fact the visitors are last in the American league's western division.

At one time in the game, the Hoosiers held a 3-0 lead, shortly after the start of the second period. But the Flyers refused to fold, fought back, kept plugging and came from behind by scoring one goal in the second stanza and two in the third.

The Flyers lost the services of one player, Jack Shewchuk, a defenseman, in the second period. He received a fractured left wrist and will be out of play indefinitely. He was taken to the City hospital and

was to return to St. Louis today while his mates went off to Pittsburgh. After Tommy Ivan's Caps fired two goals home in the first session, the rosters decided the game was sewed up. And the fans' enthusiasm soared to greater heights when the home postmeners chalked up a third goal at 1:30 of the second period.

Visitors Get Going
By that time, the Flyers were frantic and they decided to do something about it. They broke their own scoring ice at 3:29 of the second stanza while their defense halted the Caps' rushes.

At the beginning of the last period, the score was 3-1 in the Caps' favor. Finally, at 10:40 of the period, Eddie Olson put his team back in the game by eluding goalie Almas on smooth, quick passes by Hector Pozzo and Harvey Fraser. It was a well executed scoring play. The story of the tying goal has already been related.

The Caps next home game is with New Haven Sunday night, but they play at Philadelphia Saturday, and that looks like a sure victory. The Philly team has only won two games in 22 starts.
