John M. Williams Rites Tomorrow

Retired Watchmaker Lived Here 48 Years

Services for John M. Williams, retired watchmaker and jeweler who died yesterday, will be held at 3 p. m. tomorrow at Flanner & Bu- chanan mortuary. The Rev. Harry Mercer, assistant pastor of Tabernacle Presbyterian church, will officiate and cremation will follow.

Mr. Williams died at his home, 2854 N. Talbot ave., after a brief illness. He was associated with the J. H. Reed Jewelry Co. about 18 years and later operated his own shop in the Occidental building for 27 years.

At one time he was watch inspec- tor for railroads and early inter- urban lines. Following world war I he was employed by the government to train veterans in watch- making.

A native of Carmi, Ill., he had lived here 48 years. He is survived by his wife, Blanche; two brothers, Joe P. Williams, Carmi, and George B. Williams, Richmond, Va., and a niece.




