\$90,000 Released To Repair Streets

Project Is Added To Main Program

The works board today authorized the street commissioner to use \$90,000 for repair and resurfacing of secondary streets.

The secondary street repair program will be co-ordinated with a \$138,000 project to resurface several of the city's main streets.

The board also ordered a letter sent to the state highway department to determine if Meridian st. would be widened this year.

If Meridian st. is not to be widened this year, the board wants to stop installation of modern street lights along the thoroughfare.

Approve Light Meter

The board also approved installation of an electric meter at Weir Cook Municipal airport so that four lights installed there could be placed in operation. The lights will be used to light up an area where airport officials say "thievery and malicious damage" has been common.

Luther Tex, street commissioner, said the resurfacing of secondary streets will begin as soon as the weather clears. He said his department is going to use a new type of paving material to prevent such rapid deterioration as has occurred in the past.

Ask More Protection

Meanwhile, the missing boy's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Richard M. Hubbell of 28 W. 54th st., still had hope their boy might be alive.

Rumors that the boy wandered home in a state of amnesia, that his body was found floating down White river in a canoe or that it had been found in an alley still persisted.

They were only rumors. Peter's whereabouts today were still as mysterious as though the small boy had stepped off the face of the earth.

Pact Is Signed By McNutt, Roxas

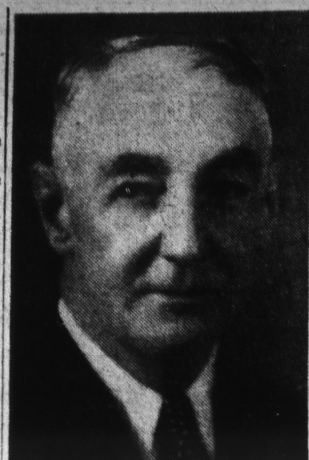
MANILA, March 21 (U. P.).—President Manuel Roxas and Ambassador Paul V. McNutt today signed a military assistance agreement between the Philippines and the United States.

The pact gives American military equipment and supplies to the Philippines armed forces. It provides for handing over 83 American ships to the new republic.

This was the last important official act of Mr. McNutt's mission here.

The former Hoosier governor, and his family are scheduled to fly to Bangkok tomorrow en route home by way of Rome, Paris, Copenhagen and other European cities.

He will be given a gala sendoff. Philippine and U. S. army and navy personnel and Manila police will combine to stage one of the biggest military parades seen in Manila before his departure.

Mystery Maneuver

Yesterday, the defense disclosed their mystery maneuver by which they hope to bar any admissions of guilt.

The defense contends the ruling should apply here as the youths were arraigned two weeks after making their confessions.

is being subjected to "external pressure" by Russia to give her a hand in guarding the straits. He urged for the second day before the committee that congress give its okay to the administration's request for \$400 million to help Turkey and Greece stand up against Russian and Communist pressures.

Won't Assume British Policy

In answering questions, the state department official made these points:

ONE: Turkey is internally stable, but is under severe economic strain from keeping a large army in a state of semi-mobilization because of the Russian threat.

TWO: The United States will not assume British policies in dealing with Greece and Turkey. This country will follow her "own policies."

THREE: This nation has no intention of influencing the Greeks in their form of government. The question of keeping the monarchy must be decided by the Greeks.

Denies 'Power Politics'

FOUR: Although all "threats to peace" should be handled by the United Nations, that does not preclude any nation from asking help of another when its economic security becomes shaky.

FIVE: The Greek-Turkish aid program does not represent a "return" to world-wide balance of power policies.

SIX: The question of whether the \$400 million aid should be regarded as a loan or a gift should be

left to the discretion of the President. Aid in "consumable items," he said, should be a grant. (Indications have been that most of the aid would be in military supplies, presumably consumable.)

Denies 'Crusade'

SEVEN: The President did not, in asking for aid for Greece and Turkey, say that America's new foreign policy was a "crusade against any ideology."

EIGHT: The United States does not intend to impose our system of government on any country to which aid is given.

NINE: If any "hostile" foreign power attempt to impose its will upon another nation, it would be regarded as a violation of the United Nations charter.

TEN: The aid request represents a new, but not revolutionary, foreign policy. It is not a "policy of expansion."

Germany and you are a Nazi. If you question our foreign policy you are an isolationist. Support of a sound economy brings the charge that you are reactionary."

At home, he charged, the executive branch of government has been "playing a game of politics with human welfare in order to cast reflections on the legislative branch." To this, he said, has been added the influence of forces from abroad to confuse issues and befuddle the attitudes of the American public.

He accused the New Deal of making things easy for Communist encroachment at home during the past 14 years and of appeasing Russia while that power gained world-wide power and prestige.

Now he said, continuing a policy of "half truth," the administration is holding up Stalin as the greatest threat to democracy since Hitler.

He urged that America, instead of playing a lone hand to help Greece and Turkey fight off communism, should lay the problem before the United Nations.

Blame on Russia

Instead of a congressional appropriation for Greece and Turkey, he said, the fight should be financed through the international bank under United Nations jurisdiction.

In answer to the obvious contention that Russia, through her veto power, would block United Nations action, he said the blame for scuttling the world organization then would be on Russia and Stalin. Under the Truman proposal for aid to Greece and Turkey, he insisted, the blame will be on the President.

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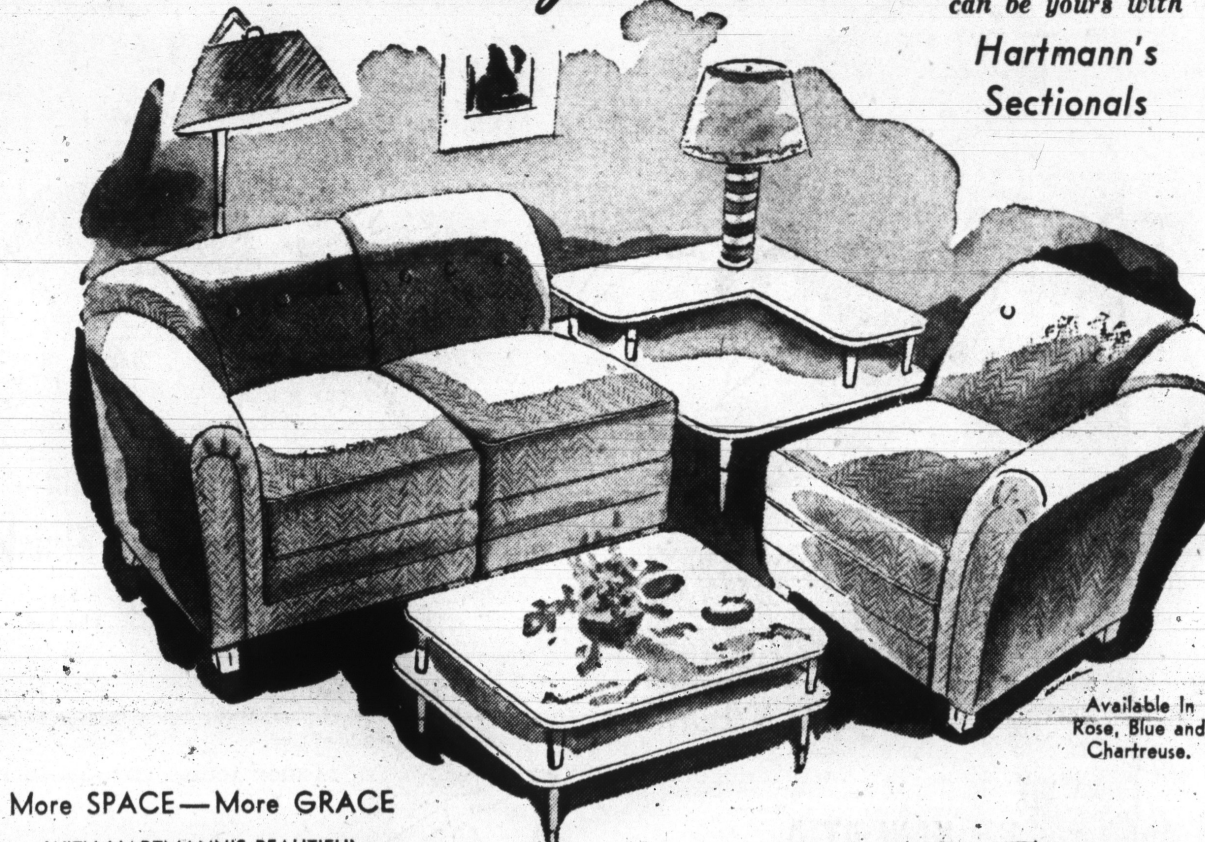
