

Clouds Scatter As Truman Starts Third Year In Office

Party Enthusiasm For Chief Runs High At Jefferson Dinner

Atmosphere Differs From Gloomy Picture Year Ago When Wallace 'Stole the Show'

WASHINGTON, April 7.—President Truman begins his third year in the White House this week with personal and party fortunes rising. Democratic strategists already are aggressively planning the campaign which they hope will bring victory in 1948.

The changed atmosphere surrounding the President and the revival of party spirit was manifest as Democratic leaders gathered here over the week-end for the Jefferson day dinner.

The Democrats' big fund-raising dinner a year ago—it honored Andrew Jackson then—was probably as funeral a political gathering as has been held in Washington in many years. Mr. Truman's stock was slipping sharply then, his speech lacked spark and Henry Wallace drew most of the applause. "Maybe it will have to be Henry in '48," they were saying then.

But this year it was Mr. Truman's show. A Jefferson day dinner, save for the presence of the President of the United States, is just about the same as any civic club dinner any place in America—the ladies in their new party dresses, the same small talk and wisecracks around the table. This one was cheery because of rising Democratic stock.

Rep. Sam Rayburn (D. Tex.), the toastmaster, did everything but nominate Mr. Truman right there. His theme song was simply: Harry Truman, typical American. When it came time to introduce Mrs. Truman, she was a "typical wife, a typical mother, a typical American home-maker." And Margaret Truman was presented as coming "from a typical American family."

From Gael Sullivan, executive director of the Democratic National committee, came a line that could be a 1948 slogan—"The Truman Way Is the Human Way." And he hailed Mr. Truman as a "tested and triumphant" leader.

Challenges Issued

Democratic leaders will continue to throw at the Republicans the challenges tossed out by President Truman on domestic issues in his Jefferson Day speech. Coming weeks probably will see important cabinet members going directly to the people in speeches appealing from Republican budget and tax policies in congress.

Democratic politicians believe that widespread criticism of Republican congressional leadership for fumbling and uncertainty, especially in government fiscal affairs, provides an opening for counter-attack.

Mr. Truman stood by the \$37½ billion budget he sent to congress as one in which all possible economies had been made. The Senate Republicans, though, voted to reduce it by \$4½ billion and their house colleagues decided they could hack a full \$6 billion from it.

Many weeks have passed and G.O.P. congressional leaders haven't been able to settle on a figure. Then, although most of the G.O.P. savings so far exist only on paper, the house passed a tax bill which would reduce federal revenues by \$4 billion a year. All this, the Democrats believe, add up to have been spoiled.

Futile Debate Over Reich Is Move to Aid Red Rule

Molotov Ignores Economic Deadlock, Talks on to Wear Down His Opponents

MOSCOW, April 7.—The Big Four's discussion of a provisional government for Germany is not likely to settle anything now.

Even if an agreement is reached on a tentative political structure, it would be conditional upon settlement of the economic unification issue.

But the economic deadlock is so complete it's not even being discussed.

Until there is resumption of negotiations on the reparations dispute, there's no way of removing Soviet obstruction to economic unity.

Delays Austrian Treaty

Debate is dragging on at Foreign Minister Molotov's insistence.

His purpose is to wear down the Americans and British and postpone discussions on the Austrian treaty and the proposed four power pact.

This debate prepares the way for a Soviet maneuver later to cheat on the German political structure controlled by the Reds.

This is hard because the Communists there so far are in a small minority. Though they may profit later by the growth of German nationalism, that isn't likely soon enough to give them control during the state-making and constitution writing period by any legitimate means.

At the moment Russians are feared in Germany and the local Communists are distrusted. This has been reflected in the exodus from the Soviet to the western zones wherever possible, and in the elections.

Working for Split

Since the Communists can wield no appreciable influence by democratic means in forming a new republic, Russia is trying here to incorporate into the proposed procedure and structure well-known facilities by which organized minorities confuse, divide, thwart and finally rule the majorities.

This includes the single-party system camouflaged as "unity coalition" and operated through bloc-voting—obligatory straight-ticket voting—after preliminary means of the proportional representation system.

Husband Freed In Griffin Slaying

Police Still Hunting 2 Men With Victim

Investigations of the murder of Mrs. Jeannette Griffin today said that "the two men we want are the ones seen drinking in a Ft. Wayne ave. tavern with the victim the night of the murder."

In reconstructing the murder, investigators said they believe Mrs. Griffin was shot, driven to the grounds of the Silver Hills Riding stable, where apparently two men dumped her body.

Gravancy charges against Stanley Griffin, estranged husband of the victim, were dismissed by John Fairfield, judge pro tem. in Beech Grove Magistrate's court this morning.

His release was at the request of

Robert Reasoner, deputy sheriff assigned to the case, who said "there is no suspicion resting on him."

Mrs. Griffin, who lived with her mother at 250 N. Tacoma ave., was buried yesterday in Greenfield. The four rooms of the Lynam funeral home were jammed although few curiosity seekers appeared. Mr. Griffin attended the services.

In pressing the search for the two men, Special Investigator Virgil Quinn said he would re-question several persons today.

Investigator Quinn pointed out the murderers were apparently looking for something in the victim's purse as the contents appeared to be scattered over the vicinity of the death site.

If they were looking for money they would have taken the \$4.35 found in her purse, he said.
