

'What's Russia Up To? J. S. Officials Like Analysis By 'Mr. X'

Diplomats Recommend Study of Article
Believed Written by State Department Aid

WASHINGTON, July 10.—For those who want to know what American officials think the Russians are up to, Washington diplomats today recommended a magazine article by an anonymous "X."

Senator Arthur H. Vandenberg (R. Mich.) more than a year ago asked: "What are the Russians up to now?" America's top diplomats would be the first to admit that they really don't know.

But there is now available to the public for the first time what is reportedly to be an analysis by one of Secretary of State George C. Marshall's top advisers on what the Russians are doing. It also tells what that official thinks the U.S. should do about it.

Judge Ponders Bail For Imel Boy

MARTINSVILLE, Ind., July 10.

Decision of Judge Omar O'Harrow on a petition asking release on bond of Richard Dale Imel, 14, Indianapolis, charged with shooting his step-mother, was awaited today.

Final testimony in the hearing which ended yesterday brought out the charge that the step-mother, Mrs. Lillian Beatrice Imel, nagged both her husband and her stepson.

Fred M. Whisler, Indianapolis detective, testified Richard Imel had told him, "she's been nagging me and Dad for everything we do and say and I just got tired of it."

During the circuit court hearing the defense introduced testimony of two Indianapolis psychiatrists which revealed for the first time that the boy may not have been in a normal state at the time of the tragedy.

The psychiatrists said the boy has an "epileptic personality."

The testimony was corroborated by testimony of the boy's father, Joseph Imel.

Dewey Acting Like a Candidate

KANSAS CITY, Mo., July 10 (UPI)—Governor Thomas E. Dewey began to drop the role of a tourist today, as he met well-wishers along the route of his 4500-mile undeclared campaign tour for the Republican presidential nomination.

The New York state governor maintained silence on campaign issues, but went through all the motions of a candidate.

Occupying the same hotel suite that President Truman uses when he visits his home state, Mr. Dewey conferred with scores of G. O. P. leaders from Kansas and Missouri.

There was a breakfast, luncheon and dinner in his honor. It was one of Mr. Dewey's busiest political days since he began his tour July 4.

A. F. L. Votes Political Action

WASHINGTON, July 10 (UPI)—The American Federation of Labor, aroused by the Taft-Hartley labor law, shattered a longstanding tradition today and went on record in favor of direct political action to purge its "enemies" in Congress.

Some 200 top officials of the A. F. L.'s national and international unions approved by acclamation a recommendation that the A. F. L. "organize, unite and concentrate its efforts" to defeat every member of Congress who voted for the new labor law.

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

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


