

Poor Relief Costs Soar in State

Leap to \$212,550
In Marion Alone

Soaring costs of direct poor relief payments by township trustees here and in 81 other counties of the state since the war, were outlined in a report by the Indiana Taxpayers association today.

In Marion county, the association said total poor relief costs jumped from \$137,301 in 1945 to \$212,550 last year.

These public benefits to indigent persons do not include old age assistance payments made by the county welfare departments.

The picture for 1947, however, may be brighter, according to Harry Meissel, chairman of the association's board of directors.

He cited figures showing that township relief rolls are now carrying 2,000 less persons in the state than were on the benefit lists during the first half of 1946.

"The cost of administering the needs of these persons has advanced an average of 6 per cent this year and if this trend is continued we can expect a much higher total for direct relief this year than in 1946," declared Mr. Meissel.

SANTA, ANA, Cal., Aug. 4 (U. P.)—Passionate love letters exchanged in jail by Beulah Louise Overall, 18, and George (Bud) Gollum, 21, were spotlighted today as the state began winding up its case against them.

The testimony of a mystery witness also was expected to be placed before the jury.

The defense was scheduled to resist bitterly introduction of the letters with which the state hopes to prove that Miss Overall is a "young woman of considerable emotional experience."

Miss Overall and Gollum are charged with slugging to death her wealthy parents, Mr. and Mrs. Walter E. Overall, and then bombing their cabin cruiser to cover up the crime.

The love notes have been submitted before the court but only for handwriting identification purposes without reference to what they said.

Stray Bullet Kills Child In Bandit Gun Battle

NEW YORK, Aug. 4 (U. P.)—Four-year-old Emilio Urrutia was killed by a stray bullet late yesterday when his father stopped to watch police close in on a suspected teen-age slayer.

The boy was returning with his father, Ramon, 35, an uncle and two aunts from a day at the beach.

Mr. Urrutia stopped the car when he saw detectives chasing Nicholas Marinocci, 19, through traffic in the Bronx.

Francis Muskavitch, 17, had told police Marinocci killed Benjamin Kaplan in a candy-store holdup early Saturday.

Detectives James Brady and John Brennan fired at Marinocci as he dodged behind an elevated tracks pillar and tugged at a foreign-made 32 caliber automatic pistol in his pocket.

Brady fired five times and Brennan once. Marinocci slumped in the street, hit in the neck and back. Four of the bullets went wild.

One struck the Urrutia child in the head.

Plan One Command For Armed Forces

WASHINGTON, Aug. 4 (U. P.)—

Secretary of Defense James Forrestal has under consideration a

plan for a sweeping reorganization of the armed forces to provide unified command of land, sea and air forces in and around the continental United States.

The plan provides for a single commander with a staff of army, navy and air officers. The commander would be directly under the joint chiefs who would command the defense of the nation's borders.

It would provide for dividing the nation into strategic areas, each of which would have its own single commander over all three forces.

Mr. Forrestal could put such a

plan into effect through executive order without congressional approval, military authorities believe.

There is already a similar plan in effect in all overseas areas. For example, Gen. Douglas MacArthur commands all three services in the Far East and Maj. Gen. H. A. Craig

And, worse than that, Fred Smythe, sideshow manager for Ringling Brothers and Barnum & Bailey, said there is no prospect of getting one.




