

British Invade U. S. Auto Field

NEW YORK, Sept. 2 (U. P.).—A formal British invasion of the American and Canadian new automobile market with a sales goal of at least \$15 million in the United States alone during the next 12 months, was announced today by Chairman L. P. Lord of the Austin Motor Co. Ltd.

Mr. Lord said the first four models of post-war cars arrived aboard the Queen Elizabeth. The British motor magnate told newsmen "there's no secret about it—we're out after American dollars."

Mr. Lord said he would aim at two American and Canadian markets—"The very low price field and the very high price field."

Logansport Woman Slugged, Robbed Here

Sneak Thief Gets \$70 Cash, Bond, Check

Two Other Attacks, Robbery Reported

A brutal footpad who slugged a 47-year-old Logansport woman and fled with her savings was being sought today by police.

The victim was Mrs. Blanche Cramer, 47, employee of Logansport Longcliff hospital who was in Indianapolis visiting her daughter, Mrs. Maxine Lovell, 523 N. Alabama St.

She was en route to the bus station, walking on Michigan near Delaware st. at 7:30 p. m. yesterday when a man darted from an alley, hitting and knocking her to the ground before wrenching her purse from her hand. He fled down an alley.

In the purse were \$300 in saving bonds, \$70 cash and a check for \$40.

The bonds were three "baby" \$75 savings bonds which Mrs. Cramer purchased 10 years ago. They matured yesterday. Mrs. Cramer bought them to Indianapolis to cash so as to buy furniture for her daughter's new home, but because the banks were closed for the holidays she had been unable to cash them.

Police also are investigating the kidnap-robbery of an 18-year-old youth, and two other sluggings.

Elmer Garrison, 18, of 1113 1/2 Bellefontaine st. came to City hospital for treatment of stab wounds after he was forced into a car and robbed at 4:30 a. m. today.

The youth told police he was walking at Massachusetts ave. and Bellefontaine st. when two men in a car pulled up and forced him into a car. They drove him to Fall Creek blvd. where one grabbed his watch and the other slashed his arm with a knife. They then threw him out of the car and sped on, he said.

Arthur D. Diehl, 514 W. Maryland st., reported he was slugged and robbed of \$14 by two men in Military Park last night. Mr. Diehl said the two men approached and asked him for a cigarette. As he reached in his pocket one hit him and the other grabbed his wallet.

Roy Murphy, 35, of 112 S. Rural st., was found in the 1000 block of S. West st. early today after he had been slugged by three unidentified men. A bystander said three men walked up to Mr. Murphy and that one struck him. After he was down another man kicked him in the face, before the trio fled.

Report Americans Hold Russian Major

LONDON, Sept. 2 (U. P.).—Moscow radio reported today that a Soviet army major in Korea was arrested by the Americans July 6 when he was bathing in Kaishu bay and was washed to the opposite shore south of the U. S.-Russian zonal border.

The major, Pulavsky, was handed over to a representative of the American command and still has not been returned to the Soviets, the broadcast said.
