Henry Reger Gets M. S. Degree

60 Will Attend
Butler Camp

Henry W. Reger, 2008 N. Delaware st., has received an M. S. degree from Butler University at the close of the post-summer session.

Mr. Reger obtained his A. B. degree from Wabash College after formerly attending Shortridge high school. He served three years in the army and has taught at Wolf Lake high school and Schreiner Institute of Kerrville, Tex.

Approximately 60 men are expected to attend the annual Butler University Y. M. C. A. freshman camp Thursday through Saturday at Flat Rock river camp. William Osborn, Bridgeport, is in charge of arrangements.

The 93d annual school year at Butler University will open Monday with registration of junior and senior classmen. Sophomores and second semester freshmen will begin Tuesday and continue through Wednesday, Sept. 10. Incoming freshmen will register Sept. 11 and 12.

Robert Way, instructor at the University of Miami (Fla.), has been appointed an assistant professor of English at Butler for the 1947-48 year.

He was graduated from University of Notre Dame in 1941 and received his M. A. degree from State University of Iowa in 1944.

2300 Boy Scout Leaders To Meet in Bloomington

**First Conference Since 1939 to Map Goals
Of International Group for Next 5 Years**

BLOOMINGTON, Ind., Sept. 2—Professional leaders of the Boy Scouts of America converged on Indiana University today for the eighth national training conference.

Some 2300 salaried scout employees are expected to be in attendance by the opening session at 8 p. m. tomorrow when a pageant will be presented.

Every corner of the nation will be represented here as will be Canada and England.

First Meeting Since 1939
The conference, which will continue through Sept. 10, seeks to develop goals for the Boy Scouts for the next five years. It is the first such gathering since September, 1939, when the scout executives met at Bretton Woods, N. H.

Navy to Dissolve Secret Society

WASHINGTON, Sept. 2 (U. P.)—The Green Bowl, Annapolis naval academy secret society allegedly devoted to helping members up the navy's professional ladder, is headed for extinction.

The society was founded 40 years ago as a drinking club. Navy investigators headed by Rear Adm. Frank J. Lowry began inquiring into its activities in July after

Capt. John G. Crommelin, famous navy flier, testified before a house committee that the bowl was an "innocently started society" grown vicious with the years.

Lowry is expected to deliver his final report late this month and will recommend that the bowl be dissolved "because there is no place in the navy for any secret society." He is expected to state, however, that there are no grounds for Capt. Crommelin's assertion that it was a secret mutual-help club.
