Post to Be
Filled Nov. 4
Notables Pay Tribute
To Ex-Congressman
Following funeral services for
Rep. Raymond S. Springer at Con-
nersville yesterday, Governor Ralph
Gates set Nov. 4 as the date for a
special election in the 10th district
to elect a successor to the veteran
congressman.
Ranking leaders of the state Re-
publican party, headed by Governor
Gates, paid final tribute to the
congressman during the last rites.
Senator Jenner Presides
Attending the services besides the
governor were U. S. Senator Wil-
liam E. Jenner, Congressman George
Gille, Earl Wilson and Forest
Harness; state auditor A. V. Burch
and state Republican chairman H.
Clark Springer.
Senator Jenner presided at special
ceremonies during which the widow,
Mrs. Nancy Springer, was presented
with a large American flag which
had draped the congressman's bier
while the body lay in state.
Loyal Public Servant
At the funeral services in the
First Methodist church at Conners-
ville, the Rev. Joseph G. Moore,
pastor, eulogized Rep. Springer as a
"loyal public servant and a good
congressman." Burial rites at Dale
cemetery were conducted by the
Masonic lodge and the American
Legion.
Active pallbearers were E. Ralph
Himeleck, Judge Allen Wiles, Clar-
ence S. Root, Christian Eby, Clyde
E. Berry, Henry Silvey, George
Jones and George F. Tatman, all
of Connersville.
Dies During 5th Term
Rep. Springer died in a hospital
at Connersville Thursday night dur-
ing his fifth term in congress. He
was Republican nominee for gov-
ernor of Indiana in 1932 and 1936.
The election for selection of
a new representative from the 10th
district will be on the same day as
the state municipal balloting. All
voters in counties comprising the
10th congressional district will cast
ballots for congressman.
Candidates for both the Republi-
can and Democratic parties will be
nominated by the respective county
chairmen in the district. The nomi-
nations will be made by Oct. 1.
No. 4 Date Protested
Some Republican leaders in the
district protested the Nov. 4 date
for the election, contending that
issues involved in the city elections
would interfere with congressional
balloting.
However, Governor Gates ex-
plained that holding the special
election with the municipal balloting
is the only logical procedure
since a separate election would in-
volve heavy expenditures.
Some of the old guard G. O. P.
leaders in Washington started a
boom for aging (86) James E. Wat-
son, former U. S. senator, for the
vacant house seat, but the veteran
congressman said he would not be
a candidate.
More than a dozen Republican
leaders in the district have been
mentioned for the G. O. P. nomi-
nation but no one has been listed
for the top position among county
chairmen.

U. S. to Study Problem
Of Europe's DP's
WASHINGTON, Sept. 2 (U. P.).
—Watson B. Miller, new U. S. com-
missioner of immigration, said to-
day that he will make a complete
study of the displaced persons
problem and consult with President
Truman before drawing up specific
recommendations for congress to
consider.
Mr. Miller's statement, made be-
fore the national executive com-
mittee of B'Nai B'rith, was the first
official indication that the admin-
istration will make specific pro-
posals on displaced persons to con-
gress next year.
Last session President Truman
urged admission of a number of
displaced persons from Europe but
did not recommend any specific
number or any detailed plan for
their admission.
