

**Husband Arrested****After Home Row****Taken After Chase Through Streets**

A wild automobile chase over West side Indianapolis ended with the arrest of Earl Anderson, 22, of 2305 E. 25th st. yesterday.

The arrest grew out of difficulties between Anderson and his wife, Betty Anderson, 325 N. Gable st., early Sunday.

Police were called to the Anderson residence Saturday night by Mrs. Anderson, who told them her husband had beaten her. After quieting the disturbance, police left, but were called back at 1 a. m. by neighbors. They said Anderson was driving up and down the street in a reckless manner and sounding his horn and flashing a spotlight.

Police parked near the home, soon they saw a car drive south on Gable. In front of Mrs. Anderson's home the driver fired a shot which struck the porch about three feet from Mrs. Anderson.

The car sped on. As the police car swung into pursuit it went faster. Police overtook the car on White River bld. Anderson was arrested on a charge of disorderly conduct, reckless driving and vagrancy. Officers confiscated a .22 rifle.

**2 Burglaries Net \$473 in Cash**

A waving patch of high grass and weeds on the southwest corner of Delaware and 14th sts., drew the ire of neighbors this morning.

Residents around the area were at wits end trying to get the patch cut. Their numerous calls to city officials have brought only promises and excuses for no mowing machines.

Today as the weeds grow taller and begin to turn brown those living nearby are becoming fearful that fire might start in the patch and spread to their homes.

The high grass overhangs the sidewalks, forcing pedestrians to walk in the street. At night, so neighbors say, vicious acting dogs romp and fight in the rank growth and shady characters are seen to emerge from the patch.

"We had the same trouble last year," she explained, "and the weeds weren't cut until late in the fall when they had turned brown and dry. I suppose it will be the same again this year."

She said she called the park department a month ago and a man came out and looked over the patch. "When he left he promised me something would be done." Mrs. Edwards said, "but that was a month ago and no one has returned."

**Suit to Decide Who May Vote****Circuit Court to Rule On City Election**

A law suit to untangle some legal technicalities regarding the right of residents in newly-annexed city areas to cast ballots in the Nov. 4 election was agreed on by county officials today.

In several areas recently annexed to the city the boundaries cut through the middle of some precincts. In order to clarify the voting status of residents in these areas for the city election the county election board and county commissioners agreed to be defendants in a friendly suit to be brought by residents in these new areas.

The new city residents will bring a petition before the election board. This action will form the basis for a suit to be brought by Scott Ging, county attorney, for a mandate order in circuit court, clarifying the right of annexed voters to cast their ballot.

Last week the county election board ruled that all annexed residents would be permitted to vote Nov. 4.

**Reserve Officers****Ask Probe of WAA**

Indiana's reserve officers were on record today with a demand for a congressional investigation of the war assets administration merchandising methods.

The state council of the officers' association adopted such a motion by a unanimous vote.

Delegates, including 60 presidents of Hoosier ROA chapters, heard State President Col. Ray C. Thomas, Gary, charge that the WAA's sales arrangements are "neither fair nor businesslike to the government, a veteran or any other purchaser."

**Youth Faces Rearrest Today In Tavern Murder Case****Pinboy Held Without Bail in Delinquency Charge After Pal's Death in Robbery**

A 16-year-old bowling alley pinboy from South Carolina was rearrested today on a murder capias after admitting to detectives that he fatally stabbed a confederate during a tavern burglary Saturday.

The youth, Vonne Lee McGee, Spartansburg, was being held without bond on a delinquency charge, although juvenile court authorities have waived jurisdiction to criminal court.

McGee and James H. McCarron, 31, also of Spartansburg, confessed burglarizing Karl's tavern, 420 W. Washington st., for a mandate order in circuit court, clarifying the right of annexed voters to cast their ballot.

—Anderson was slain by McGee, while both stood behind the bar in the semi-darkness of the tavern. Meanwhile, McCarron was standing

outside as a lookout.

McGee said he warned Anderson to get down so no one will see him. Anderson became angry and swung a bottle at him, McGee's confession states. He then thrust a 10-inch knife in Anderson's back.

McCarron will be arraigned Sept. 19, in municipal court 3, on a vagrancy charge. He also is being held without bond.
