

'Picking' Pockets— By Wife—Upheld

ST. LOUIS, Mo., Sept. 12 (U. P.).—A wife has a "legal as well as moral right" to rifle her husband's pockets while he sleeps, a circuit court judge ruled yesterday.

Moreover, he said, she can take "any amount of money she sees fit."

The ruling was made during a divorce hearing before Judge Eugene J. Sartorius, who protested, "Why, even my wife does that and I can't do a thing about it."

Judge Sartorius ruled for Mrs. Mae V. Robinson, 22, who had filed suit against Ransom M. Robinson, 25, of East St. Louis, Ill.

FRENCHTOWN, N. J., Sept. 12 (U. P.).—Henry A. Wallace, who edits a magazine and farms as a hobby, soon may become a chicken farmer.

Mr. Wallace has bid an undisclosed amount for the \$250,000 Kerr Chickeries near here, a 240-acre chicken farm capable of producing more than 3,000,000 chickens a year.

Mr. Wallace's bid was disclosed by Ryman Kerr, counsel for the estate of the late G. B. Kerr, who owned the farm.

Iowans Charge Entry Denied Into U. S. Zone

GLASGOW, Sept. 12 (U. P.).—Spokesmen for 25 Iowa farmers, who crossed the Atlantic for a first hand study of conditions in Europe, reported today that they had been refused permission by the U. S. army to enter the American occupation zone of Germany.

Eight of the Iowans accepted a British invitation to visit the British zone of Germany. The remainder expected to go on to other countries in Europe.

Commenting on their observations on British farms, the Iowans agreed that agricultural mechanization in this country was at least 20 years behind that of the United States.
