Nubbins Faces 1000 to 1 Odds

DENVER, Oct. 7 (U. P.).—Forrest (Nubbins) Hoffman was in a Denver hospital today for a diagnosis and checkup in preparation for a serious kidney operation.

The odds are about 1000-to-1 against him.

The 6-year-old, whose home is in Cheyenne, Wyo., won out over similar odds in 1944, when it was thought he would not live for Christmas.

He celebrated the day—with toys from well-wishers throughout the nation—in November.

Attendants, who said he was not scheduled for surgery today, reported he was sleeping soundly last night.

Nubbins, son of Mr. and Mrs. Marshall Hoffman, entered the hospital yesterday afternoon, after a trip to Denver's zoo and a lunch downtown.

Doctors said that this week's operation would be the first of two—both delicate, but necessary to save him from death within two years.

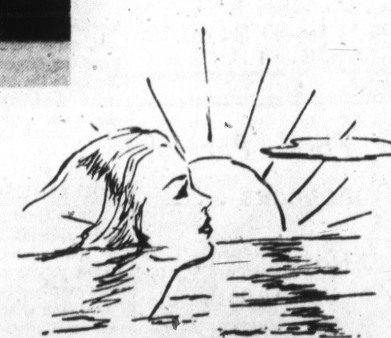
