## My Day— Congressman Fails to See The Hungry

HYDE PARK, N. Y., Oct. 7.—It is wonderful that Congressman Taber has seen no underfed people in Rome, Trieste, Vienna, Istanbul, Ankara and Berlin. I am afraid Congressman Taber is one of those people who go to the right places to see the things they want to see and when anything which they prefer not to see turns up, they just don't see it.

There are too many people who have covered the places he mentioned and come back with heavy hearts, having seen and understood the misery of human beings, for us to do more than smile when we read Congressman Taber's remarks.

When I come across remarks like Mr. Taber's and then receive pitiful letters describing the amount of food available in different parts of the world and the price at which it is available, I begin to wonder whether we are entitled to have in our government people with so little ability to find out what the real situation is. Even if it takes walking around a block or two in unsavory neighborhoods, it might make for a more truthful picture.
