## Stomach 'Window' Shows Emotions Rule Digestion

Effects of Anger, Fear, Depression Described At Medical Association Meeting

MILWAUKEE, Oct. 7.—A "window" in the abdominal wall of a human guinea pig has enabled scientists to gain direct experimental proof of emotion's well-known impact on the workings of the stomach.

The Wisconsin State Medical Society heard the results of studies made on "Tom," a New York hospital laboratory assistant, in whom the direct stomach opening was made for feeding purposes after hot soup burns in childhood permanently closed his throat.

The study recalled appetite and hunger observations made in a similar fashion on the University of Chicago's famous "Fred V." several years ago.

Tom's stomach responses varied according to the emotional stimulus. Dr. Harold G. Wolff of New York told the medical society.

Whenever Tom became angered or frustrated, convulsive muscular contractions started in the stomach like those which take place when food is being digested.

An excess of acid secretion followed and tiny bleeding spots some-

times appeared on the stomach lining. It was found these spots could be developed into ulcers by steady exposure to the gastric acid.

When Tom developed fear or depression, acid secretion and stomach contractions were blocked, resulting in a feeling of fullness and nausea.

The studies emphasized the appetite is associated with the mind and not the stomach.

The settings which produced the emotional stress in Tom were spontaneous life situations and not set up experimentally, Dr. Wolff said.

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## Bishop Oxnam, Others Chosen To Make Talks

Two-Day Convention Opens Here Oct. 23

A Methodist bishop, a college president, a diplomat, an expert on plebiscites and a radio singer will be the headliners of the 94th annual convention of the Indiana State Teachers Association.

The annual meeting of Hoosier school teachers, expected to attract 15,000 this year, will be held here Oct. 23 and 24.

Forty-seven departmental meetings are scheduled the first day. Robert H. Wyatt, executive secretary of the organization, announced Preconvention meetings will be held Oct. 22 by the City and Town Superintendents' Association and the County Superintendents' Association.

Bishop Oxnam to Speak

G. Bromley Oxnam, bishop of the Methodist Church of New York City and former president of De Pauw University, will address the evening session of the convention of Oct. 23 in Cagle Tabernacle. He will speak on "The Challenge of a Divided World."

William E. Wilson, Clark County schools superintendent and president of the ISTA, and Gov. Gates also will speak. The keynote address will be given by Dr. Glenn E. Snow of the Dixie Junior College, St. George, Utah, who also is president of the National Education Association.

A reception and ball will be held in the Claypool Hotel.

Radio Star to Sing

Dr. Sarah Wambugh, an authority on plebiscites, will speak on "Greece, Turkey and the Truman Doctrine" at the second general session the next afternoon. Miss Margaret Daum, current star of the radio program, American Album of Familiar Music, will sing.

Arthur Bliss Lane, former U. S. ambassador to Poland, will speak on "Our Foreign Policy—Right or Wrong?" at the final evening session.

At this session, 1100 public school pupils from throughout the state will present a 30-minute dramatic program under direction of Don Craig, choral director for Fred Waring.

## U. S. Launches Search For Red Technicians

WASHINGTON, Oct. 7 (U. P.).—The State and Justice Departments have ordered a nation-wide search to track down any Soviet technicians traveling in the United States without permission.

Watson B. Miller, immigration commissioner, declared his department did not know the whereabouts of a group of Russian technicians who recently visited a Michigan plant. The Russians were observing American production methods.

The group may have returned to Russia. The technicians came into the country under special visas as government officials. This was arranged by the State Department at the request of the Kremlin.

Because of their special visas, they could move about the country as they wished. Nationals of many other foreign countries are accorded the same privilege.

## Kush Atom Output For Peace Uses

DETROIT, Oct. 7 (U. P.).—David E. Lilienthal, chairman of U. S. Atomic Energy Commission, today gave American industry the green light on development of atomic energy for peace-time uses. He named a special board of consultants to speed the process.

Mr. Lilienthal named James W. Parker, president of the Detroit Edison Co., to head the board.

He said the new panel had two initial purposes:

ONE: To aid the commission in applying atomic energy to practical, useful projects through private business.

TWO: To keep American industry informed, within security limitations, of atomic developments.

The board will be asked, he said, to recommend a plan for expanding and intensifying industrial participation in atomic power research.

Among the industrialists named to the board was Robert E. Wilson, chairman of the board, Standard Oil Co. of Indiana.

## Lewis Belton Rites Set at Greenwood

GREENWOOD, Oct. 7.—Services will be held here tomorrow afternoon for Lewis Belton, civic leader and manager of Polk Memorial Community House in Greenwood for the last 11 years. Mr. Belton, who was 65, died at his home here Sunday.

He is survived by his wife, one son, Thomas of Indianapolis, and three daughters, Mrs. E. R. Skillman of Greenwood; Mrs. H. R. Booty of Washington, D. C., and Mrs. Max Eddy of Vineland, N. J.

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Coldest weather in the nation will be reported in the northern Plains where temperatures will dip into the frosty 30s as cold Canadian air pushes down toward the front from Michigan to Nebraska.

Forecasters are calling for rain from South Carolina to Maryland and from Michigan to Washington and northern California. Scattered showers will develop in the affected areas over the central Plains, the southern Rockies, Idaho and Nevada while some sections of the northern Rockies can expect snow.

Hatched lines on the inset map show where skies will be partly cloudy in the next 24 hours. It will be mostly cloudy in the rainy affected areas.

The front which extends from

Michigan through Nebraska to

Nevada marks the line along which warm, moist southerly winds are clashing with cold Canadian air. Short arrows attached to the fronts show the path the fronts and the accompanying affected areas are moving.

The amateur can readily determine weather trends by watching the motion of fronts and air masses. Southerly winds indicate warm, moist air while a northerly wind brings clearing and colder weather. Storms develop near the fronts where these air flows meet.

Minimum temperature forecasts include Duluth 30, Milwaukee 50, Philadelphia 56, Detroit 58, Washington 59, New York, Boston, Chicago and Cleveland 60, Nashville 61, St. Louis and Atlanta 62, and Kansas City 65.

all pretence had been tossed aside now. The "phony" stage was over. The lines were clearly drawn except that both sides claimed Italy and France. Those two unhappy countries were the immediate stakes in the conflict. There the first battle between communism and capitalism will be waged in the coming months.

Cite 2 Key Results

Two immediate results of the new Communist "information bureau" will be:

ONE: A decision by Secretary of State George C. Marshall to present his European economic recovery plan to congress on political as well as economic grounds.

TWO: Inevitable failure of the Big Four to agree on peace treaties for Germany and Austria in London next month and the probable collapse of the Big Four machinery.

But United Nations delegates, alarmed and dismayed at the hopeless outlook for an East-West reconciliation after the new Communist international manifesto against American "imperialism," agreed that the ultimate victim will be the United Nations itself.

These delegates foresaw no immediate collapse of the organization which was created in the closing days of the war as man's latest hope for preventing another war. But paralysis of both the Security Council and the Assembly has set in and the United Nations has become a tool of the two great powers in their ideological struggle.

One middle-of-the-road delegate pointed out that both the United States and the Soviet Union have rejected the basic concept of the United Nations—one world.

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
