

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 7 (U. P.)—Hans Eisler, film composer charged with concealing Communist affiliations, and his wife, Louise, were free on bail today pending a deportation hearing.

The bespectacled, German-born musician whose brother, Gerhart Eisler, has been called the "brains" behind U. S. Communists, appeared yesterday with his wife before District Immigration Director William A. Carmichael.
