Dear Mrs. Manners:

I AM ONE of a group of practicing social cases workers with a minimum of six years' college training and wide experience in helping people out of trouble. Many of us are serving through Community Fund supported agencies.

Your column has impressed me with the great need which exists in Indianapolis for counseling on personal problems. As you have ably proven, many people can be helped by reading the carefully thought out answers to their difficulties which appear in your column. Many others are in need of the close, intimate, confidential help which can be provided by a face-to-face relationship with trained and experienced family and child welfare counselors.

We get more problems than we can handle but we don't get them soon enough. Too many marriages are virtually on the "rocks" and too many children have been caught in the act of stealing before families in need of help learn about us.

We have what it takes to help those in trouble but we can do it effectively only if we can reach them early.

A PROFESSIONAL. As you say, problems would lessen if troubled persons availed themselves of the advisory services of churches, social agencies, schools and the YMCA and YWCA. These groups provide pre-marital counseling and family guidance. The Family Service Association, Catholic Charities Bureau, and Jewish Social Services, Inc. deal with family problems. All three groups are members of the Council of Social Agencies and the Community Fund.

Dr. Grover L. Hartman, Church Federation social service department secretary, can supply names of Protestant churches conducting pre-marriage classes, and information regarding pre-marital counseling by Catholic priests can be obtained at the Catholic Chancery, Georgia St. Catholic Charities Bureau counsels married couples.

"Marriage and the Family" courses are conducted by Butler University, taught by Dr. James H. Peck, and Indiana College, with Dr. Lowell E. Macchile, instructor. Classes to "insure future happiness" are taught by Central YMCA and YWCA, Senate Ave. Branch of the YMCA, Phyllis Wheatley Branch of the YWCA, Flanner House, and many churches.

Classes to thwart unhappy marriages among veterans are held by the American Red Cross and Veterans Administration, with psychiatric aid given by the Indiana Neuropsychiatric Association. Families having "drunk" problems can contact Alcoholics Anonymous. The Maternal Health League advises parents wishing children. Family agencies and banks give advice on money matters.

The YWCA and YMCA, churches and neighborhood centers suggest group fellowship activities. Persons with legal tangles are advised to visit their attorney or the Indianapolis Legal Aid Society. Health problems are considered by family physicians, Visiting Nurse Association, Red Cross home services and City Health Department.

Parents needing guidance in disciplining children may visit the City Health Department, Visiting Nurse Association, Church Federation, and Day Nursery Association. The child's own problems are considered by social service departments in the public and parochial schools.

Advice for the physically handicapped is provided by the Marion County Society for the Crippled, Society for the Hard of Hearing, Marion County Department of Public Welfare, and Marion County Chapter of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis.

Unmarried mothers may contact the Family Service Association and the Catholic Charities Bureau. Parent-Teachers Associations and study groups, the Indianapolis Social Hygiene Association, and the Red Cross assist in solving family and child problems.
