## Coach-of-Year Spotlight Focused on Frank Leahy

NEW YORK, Nov. 14.—The masterful coaching job he did prepping Notre Dame for the Army, as well as season-long skill in guiding his warriors, focuses attention on Frank (The Master) Leahy this week as a prime candidate for 1947 Coach of the Year honors.

Few coaches ever enjoy the delight of a "perfect" game from their

standpoint, meaning smart play execution and a minimum of errors.

Notre Dame came as close as possible to it against the Cadets.

There are those who claim Leahy tempered the Irish play with mercy by cutting down on Lujack's passing. However, he stated afterward, and Jack Lavelle, the scout who worked with Leahy all last week, confirms it, that Notre Dame's strategy was to run wide on Army. When Lujack declared it wasn't a good day to throw passes, that made it all the more certain the Irish would run.

**Special Attack**  
They ran, too—mostly wide off a shovel pass, sometimes off tackle. It was a well-conceived special attack planned by a great strategist to hit the Army's weakness, its ends. It worked perfectly, and Leahy should take a low bow.

If he were selected by his fellow coaches as 1947 Coach of the Year, Leahy would be the first ever to repeat in this unique post-season award. Frank was single for the honor in 1942, his first season at Notre Dame.

Last Saturday's biggest upset projected another man into the 1947 Coach of the Year picture—Rip Engle, the quiet little Brown mentor who toppled Yale so unexpectedly.

His material this year was not impressive, yet Engle crossed up Holy Cross and Yale, tied Colgate and barely yielded to Dartmouth—in other words, a fine job of coaching in any league.

**Little in Spotlight**  
Lou Little continues to hold the spotlight for a great job of pulling his team back together. After two straight defeats the Lions ended the Army string in a sensational reversal and downed Cornell and Dartmouth.

Matty Bell, still riding high with his Southern Methodist Mustangs; Fritz Crisler, who swamped Indiana; Tom Hamilton, who took on the high road to the Rose Bowl; Navy's Tom Hamilton, who took on one of the toughest schedules in football history and nearly pulled a night upset with Georgia Tech; Don Faurot, who brought Missouri along to the point where it swamped Duke in Durham, and Jeff Cravath, who is doing things with his Southern California club, are others to keep in mind, when the voting of the coaches starts.

## Caps Tied for 2d Spot After 6-2 Triumph

### Swamp New Haven In Final Period

NEW HAVEN, Conn., Nov. 14—The Indianapolis Capitals climbed back up into the thick of the American League's Western Division hockey race today after outskating the New Haven Ramblers, 6 to 2, here last night before 3000 fans.

The defeat knocked New Haven from second place in the Eastern Division to make room for Providence that took over with a 2-2 tie last night at home against the St. Louis Flyers.

New Haven took the play away from the Caps in the first period on goals by Bing Jukes and Scotty Cameron, but the Caps came back strong in the second 20 minutes when they countered twice within 15 seconds to even the score. Barry Sullivan and Don Morrison were the goal-getters for the Caps.

Indianapolis hogged the third period scoring. Fernand Gauthier caged the winning marker at 7:30 with Lloyd Don and Marty Pavlich assisting. The Caps turned the game into a rout then as Nelson Podolosky, Cliff Simpson and Don Morris scored.

### 5 Forwards Give Providence a 2-2 Tie

PROVIDENCE, R. I., Nov. 14 (UPI)—Rapping home a pair of goals within 22 seconds, the Rhode Island Reds came from behind to gain a 2-2 tie with the St. Louis Flyers in an American Hockey League game before 4214 fans in Rhode Island Auditorium last night.

St. Louis was protecting a two-goal lead it had picked up in the second period of the slow contest until Flyers' Defenseman Billy McComb drew a two-minute hooking penalty shortly after the midway mark had been reached.

Providence Coach Terry Reardon sent five forwards on the attack, and Left Winger Pete Kapusta netted the puck after a plien in front of Goalie Hec Highton at 11:41.

Only 22 seconds later Eddie Prokop came out of a scramble to the right of the Flyers' cage and beat Highton on a sizzling angle shot at 12:03.

The Flyers took their lead when Left Winger Paul Gladu beat Goalie Harvey Bennett at 4:11 of the second period, Center Don Grosso and Ron Wilson assisting. St. Louis scored again at 13:56 when Center Ernie Trigg converted Hec Pozzo's pass into a goal.
