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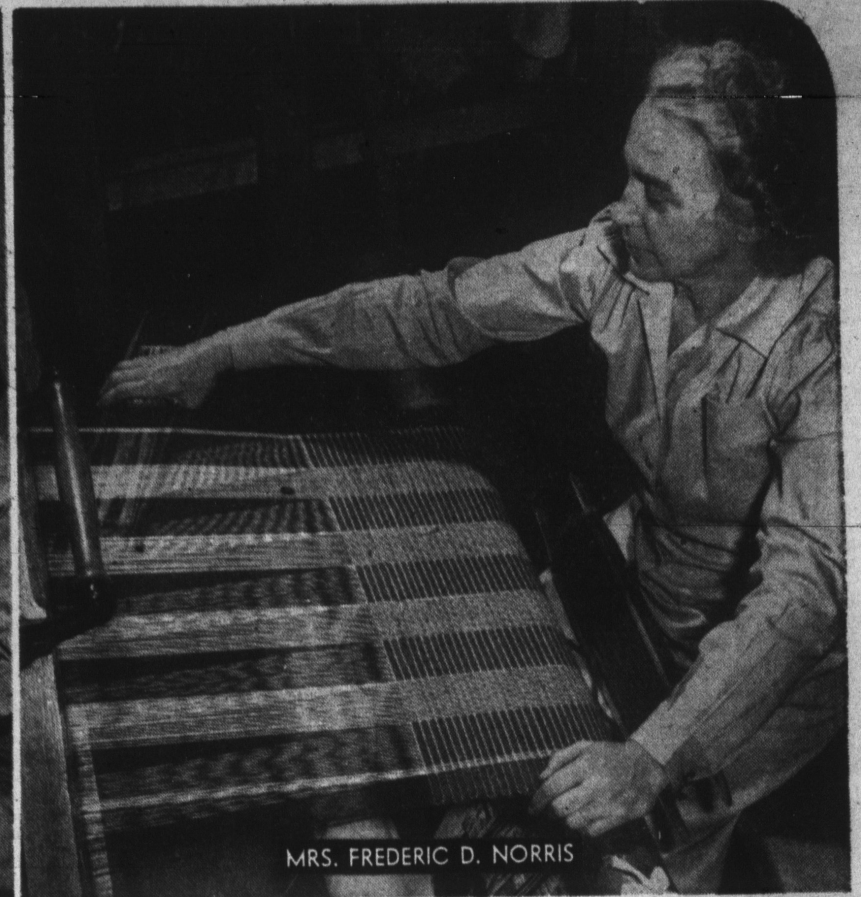

Proceeds of the dance will be used in service work at General Hospital where, for the 40 years of the guild's existence, it has carried on volunteer activities.

Although active membership is limited to 60 women, a tremendous amount of work has been done by the guild in that 40-year history. At first, interest centered in the children's ward of the old City Hospital. Later, in 1914 when the Burdall Unit was added, the guild furnished the new children's wards, had walls decorated by Indiana artists and provided attendants to care for non-medical needs of the patients. Maintenance of the wards and provision of clothing, toys, games, books and entertainment are still among guild activities.

Establishment of the occupational therapy department, in co-operation with the Indianapolis Foundation and the hospital, came in 1926. This guild still maintains, securing equipment and supplies and paying a staff of registered therapists. One of the latter serves full time in the Flower Mission for tubercular patients and another in the psychopathic ward.

Most recent project is sponsoring the hospital's human milk station to benefit new-born babies in the maternity ward. The guild is non-sectarian and receives some of its income from the Indianapolis Foundation and other private donations. Adding materially to this income, however, are the organization's own fund-raising projects such as the "Christmas Carousel" dance.

**Club Women Hear GFWC President**

The importance of women's uniting in friendship for peace was emphasized in a talk here yesterday afternoon by Mrs. J. L. Blair Buck, Richmond, Va., president of the General Federation of Women's Clubs.

Mrs. Buck spoke before the Seventh District, Indiana Federation of Clubs, at a meeting in Block's Auditorium. Mrs. Jasper P. Scott was the program chairman.

"Women must build a chain of friendship around the world," Mrs. Buck declared. "The stronger the chain, the better chance there is for a peaceful world."

Mrs. Buck recently returned from Europe, where she attended a conference of the Women's World Fellowship. She visited France, Switzerland, Denmark and England.

"It is the middle class which is suffering so tragically in France," Mrs. Buck said. "The peasants hold the food for the flourishing black market at which only the wealthy are able to buy."

"One-half the children born in France since the war have perished for lack of food, and conditions in Italy are similar," she added.
