## Hagana Makes Retaliation Raids on Arab Colonies

Jerusalem, Jan. 1.—The Jewish underground army Hagana said today that its militia had made heavy attacks upon Arab settlements in Haifa and Jaffa last night in retaliation for the death of 42 Jews at the Haifa Consolidated Refineries Tuesday.

An official British announcement said that four Arabs were killed and 31 wounded, many seriously, in the Haifa attack.

A spokesman for Hagana said the attacks were the largest punishment operation yet carried out in the month-old war set off by the United Nations' decision to partition Palestine.

Jewish militia attacked the Arab settlement near the refineries with machine guns, grenades, fire bombs and dynamite, the spokesman said, inflicting "heavy casualties."

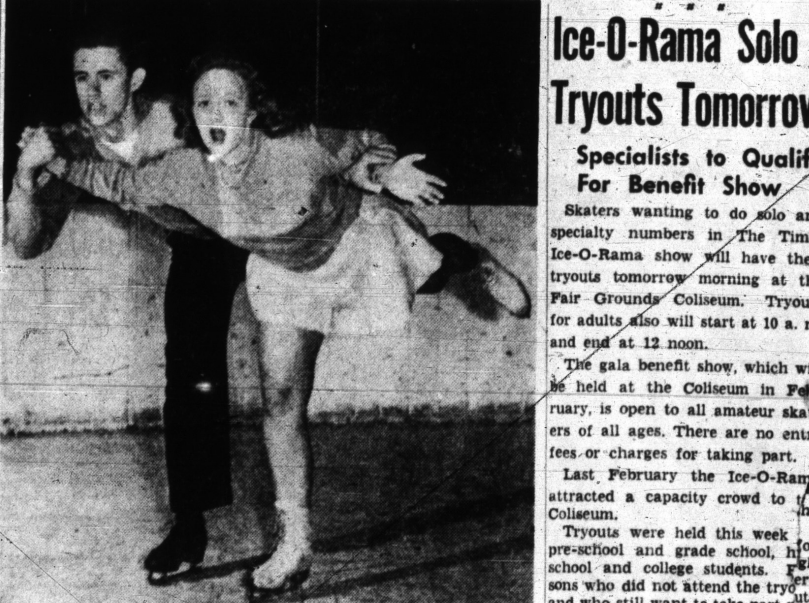

## Vandenberg Gives Boost to Marshall Plan

## Again Takes 'Nan' Out of '48 Race

WASHINGTON, Jan. 1.—Sen. Arthur H. Vandenberg's latest move to remove his name from the list of Republican presidential aspirants was today as strong as his "no politics" in the forthright fight on the Marshall Plan.

The 63-year-old Michigan Republican is chairman of the Foreign Relations Committee and also his party's leader on foreign policy matters. Yesterday foreign Republican leaders in his state wrote say he didn't want his name to be sent or supported in the pre-national convention at the GOP Philadelphia.

The letter marked his third move to take himself out of the presidential race. It came after the congressional debate on the European Recovery Program, the hottest battle over foreign policy in years.

Backs Marshall Plan Principle  
Sen. Vandenberg's friends believed his letter was motivated by a desire to free himself of any suspicion of a partisan motive in waging the fight for the Marshall Plan. They help western Europe. Vandenberg's principle behind the plan is such.

The senator faces the heavy responsibility of piloting debate on the Marshall Plan in a year when local considerations will weigh on both sides of the aisle. One-third of the Senate and all House members face re-election campaigns, campaigns in which the foreign spending issue will play a major role.

"This is a good time to clear the atmosphere," Sen. Vandenberg told a reporter in explaining the timing of his letter. He referred to the debate to come. In the letter to Republican leaders he said: "I am confident that I can best serve my country by completing my present term in the Senate. I urge that my name shall not be presented or supported either in the Michigan state convention or in the national convention at Philadelphia."

"Draft" Not Ruled Out  
In Detroit, Michigan Republican leaders indicated they would support Gov. Thomas E. Dewey of New York for the presidential nomination in view of Sen. Vandenberg's statement.

Sen. Vandenberg's letter, however, did not preclude possibility of a "draft Vandenberg" move.
