

No Flu Lights For Congress—The Old Remedies Must Do

WASHINGTON, Jan. 2 (UP)—The White House can play with Buck Rogers anti-cold gadgets to its heart's content but Congress isn't having any, thank you.

It's not that the legislators object to setting up batteries of ultra-violet lamps to protect the President against flu germs. It's just that they prefer the good, old-fashioned remedies.

"We experimented with ultra-violet lights and they didn't work so well," said Dr. George W. Calver, Capitol physician. "They might be all right in the White House but our architecture is different and we have to take a different approach."

Dr. Calver said ultra-violet lights were tried out when the House gymnasium was built. On the basis of experiments made at that time, it was discovered that so much power would be needed to make them effective they would be dangerous.

"That's because we would have to cover such large spaces with the ultra-violet rays," he explained. "In the White House, which consists of a number of much smaller rooms, they don't have the problem of flooding large spaces."

Practical in White House
The White House was recently equipped with ultra-violet ray lights to guard the President's health. His physicians say they have reduced the bacterial content of the air to a considerable degree.

Dr. Calver, who is responsible for the health of the nation's legislators, has devised "ten commandments" of health to ward off colds. He has them displayed prominently in the elevators and offices of the Capitol buildings. They are:

ONE: Keep away from those already infected.

TWO: Dress sensibly according to the temperature and weather.

THREE: Keep out of stuffy, crowded, overheated places.

FOUR: Have office temperature 72.8 degrees, or below, with humidity of 40 in cold weather.

FIVE: Drink lots of water regularly.

SIX: Avoid overeating.

SEVEN: Learn to sit and breathe properly.

EIGHT: Get a regular amount of outdoor exercise.

NINE: Do not use drinking cups, towels or tableware used by others.

TEN: Check up occasionally.

Body of Girl, 8, Found on Porch

ENGLEWOOD, O., Jan. 2—Used to be that Clyde Fetter thought maybe he was just about the busiest man in this village of 531 population 12 miles north of Dayton. Now he's sure of it.

About the time he'd get to cutting a nice bunch of chrysanthemums for a customer and doing them up real fancy with a ribbon, some fellow who overslept would charge in and demand a 15-minute shave in 180 seconds flat.

"Boy, I thought I had plenty to keep me jumping them, but that's before they slipped one over on me," said Mr. Fetter.
