**Mayor Rejects
Official Car
As Economy****Strict Watch Ordered
On City Vehicle Use**

Strict economy measures went into effect at City Hall today as the new administration of Mayor Al Feeney began its first full day of duty.

The mayor was first to set an example of savings. He will not use the City's car provided for the mayor and will have no chauffeur.

And while the police and fire departments adjusted themselves following a big shakeup, Safety Board President Leroy J. Keach, on the advice of Mayor Feeney, issued orders that a strict watch would be kept on the use of City vehicles to see that they are being used for City business only.

Mr. Keach also advised the heads of departments under the Safety Board to begin planning for 1949 so that by August they will be prepared to submit figures for next year's budget.

\$500,000 in Unpaid Bills

Biggest economic boulder in the path of the new administration is the approximate \$500,000 in unpaid bills due, including utility bills, and the \$330,000 "arithmetic error" of the last administration.

Mayor Feeney, members of the City Council and City Clerk Richard Stewart were sworn into office yesterday at ceremonies in City Hall attended by more than 1000 well-wishers.

The mayor, in his brief inaugural address, told the audience, "This community is in no mood for selfishness and self-seeking and is as determined as I am to brook no interference by pressure groups or individuals seeking to use this city's government and facilities for purposes benefiting a few to the detriment of many."

"I make no partisan appeal," he continued, "but rather one directed to every decent citizen whose support I ask so that the job of restoring the good name of our city can be accomplished."

A Eulogy to His Mother

In a voice full of emotion he said: "My mother, the one person above all others whom I would like to have here today is unable to be with us but is listening by radio. I want her to know that my greatest ambition is to be the kind of mayor she wants me to be for there is no person on earth to whom I owe so much and am as anxious to please."

The mention of his mother, Mrs. Mary Feeney, 81, who in St. Vincent's Hospital suffering from a broken hip bone, brought tears to the eyes of Mayor Feeney's two sisters, Mrs. E. O. Marquette of Roanoke, Virginia, and Mrs. E. O. Marquette of Indianapolis, who were with him on the platform.

At the end of the ceremony the new City Council held its first meeting in the council chamber on the fourth floor.

Christian J. Enhardt was elected president and Joseph C. Wallace became vice president. Both are Democrats.

Mayor Feeney retired to his office and opened the doors to visitors. Hundreds of persons filed through and offered him their congratulations.

Some Jobs Still Open

But even while ceremonies were in progress members of the new administration were wrestling with major personnel problems.

Not all boards have been filled by Mr. Feeney and a number of office jobs are still open.

Appointments are yet to be made in the Park Board, Air Pollution Board, City Plan Commission, Aviation Board, and the General Hospital Board.

The Sanitation Board is also to be appointed since the term of one member, Herbert J. Reade, expired at the end of the year, and the two other members, Michael L. Fawcett and Fred N. Reynolds have handed in the resignations effective when their successors are appointed.

Retired, Gen. Lee Now Ready for Church Post

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 2 (UPI)—Retired Lt. Gen. C. H. (Courtouse) Lee, supply commander in Europe during the war, will begin his civilian duties as general secretary of the Protestant Episcopal Brotherhood of St. Andrews tomorrow.

Lee closed out his long and controversial military career in retirement ceremonies at the Presidio here yesterday with 15 other long-time soldiers.

"I don't think I'm out of the service, even now," Lee said. "I'll always be a soldier."
