Senator Says Broker Failed To Yield All Graham Records

Ferguson Says Pauley Report Incomplete

Probers to Call Stassen, He Asserts

WASHINGTON, Jan. 5 (UP)—Sen. Homer Ferguson (R. Mich.) charged today that the brokerage firm which handled the commodity market account of Brig. Gen. Wallace H. Graham, White House physician, has failed to produce all the records.

Ferguson also charged that Edwin W. Pauley had failed to give his Senate Appropriations Subcommittee all the information it sought.

The Michigan Republican disclosed that Harold E. Stassen, GOP presidential aspirant who kicked off the investigation into speculation by government insiders, "will be called before the committee Thursday."

Mr. Stassen will be asked to tell what he knows about commodity speculations by "important federal officials," Sen. Ferguson said.

Singles Out Pauley

Mr. Stassen was the first to single out Mr. Pauley, special assistant to the Secretary of the Army. Shortly before Gen. Graham was disclosed to have speculated in wheat, he also had demanded that the administration disclose those in the "inner circle" at the White House who were speculating.

Sen. Ferguson's announcement and charges were made shortly after his subcommittee took a quick look at the information furnished over the week-end on dealings of Gen. Graham and Mr. Pauley.

"Neither one of the accounts was complete," Sen. Ferguson said.

"They just didn't send the books and records in the Pauley case," he said. "They sent us a memorandum prepared by his auditor. We want the records and have asked for them. They sent us some more data this morning, but we haven't yet looked at that."

Record Incomplete

"In the Graham case, the broker just gave us photostatic copies of part of the records."

This referred to records which the committee obtained by subpoena a few hours earlier.

Bache & Co., the brokerage firm which handled Gen. Graham's deals, was asked to submit all supporting data, such as correspondence, orders to buy and sell, and other pertinent information. Gen. Ferguson said.

Meanwhile, Rep. August H. Andruss (R. Minn.), chief of the House speculation investigators, left on a "secret trip" aimed at finding out whether any government employee had been gambling in grain and commodity markets. He will report to his committee this week.

Sen. Andersen took time to blast back at Sen. Scott W. Lucas (D. Ill.), who said Mr. Andersen's reference to a Chicago grain pool allegedly made up of federal workers was "politically motivated." Mr. Andersen said Sen. Lucas' statement itself was "politics." And he said he made no charges but merely asked for information.

Group's Aim Is to Capture Presidency

WASHINGTON, Jan. 5 (UP)—Senate Republican policy-makers were called together today to begin hammering out a party legislative program which they hope will put a Republican in the White House a year hence.

The second session of the 80th Congress convenes tomorrow.

And on the eve of this campaign year session, Chairman Robert A. Taft, of the Senate Republican policy committee summoned the group to decide how it should proceed in developing a program.

The House Republican policy committee will meet later this week.

Sen. Robert A. Taft, of Ohio, and Sen. George A. Smathers, of Florida, are the leaders of the group.

The group's aim is to capture the Presidency.
