Others Reaped \$3 Million More—Stassen

Candidate Testifies At Senate Inquiry

WASHINGTON, Jan. 9 (UP)—Harold E. Stassen charged today that "government insiders" made a \$4 million killing in grain and commodity speculations since the end of the war.

The 40-year-old Republican presidential aspirant told Senate investigators that Edwin W. Pauley was one of those who profited most to the tune of \$1 million.

And Mr. Stassen said that President Truman's physician, Brig. Gen. Wallace H. Graham, "was not truthful" in statements about his wheat speculations. Contrary to Gen. Graham's assertions that he lost money, Mr. Stassen charged that the White House doctor in fact made a profit.

Army of Arabs Invades Palestine

Force of 2000 Starts Drive From Levant

JERUSALEM, Jan. 9 (UP)—Arab expeditionary forces perhaps 2000 strong invaded Palestine from the Levant in a number of border crossings today.

The Arabs stormed scattered Jewish towns in the face of strong resistance by British army and Jewish defense units.

An official announcement said British troops "succeeded in bringing the situation under control" after "a large number of Arabs" attacked.

One Jew was killed and four were injured at Kfar Sazul and two Jews were injured at Dan, the announcement said. It added that British authorities were investigating the attack.

Advices from Beirut said the invaders were intent on wiping out the 12,000 or so Jewish settlers in the Safad and Tiberias districts, the northeasternmost in Palestine.

The Arabs planned to sweep across the Palestinian thumb jutting to the northeast, and cut off the inhabitants before aid could reach them from other Jewish centers, Beirut dispatches said.

While there were references to the march of the Arabs in a proclaimed holy war, early reports of the invasion suggested that it was of relatively limited scope and purpose.

The invading Arabs were dressed mostly in Syrian army uniforms. They invaded in motorized formations.

One stopped outside Kfar Sazul, three miles below the northern border, and attacked the village, made up predominantly of American Zionists, at the foot of a sloping hill.

Lives of 2 Babies Saved By Local Doctor's Skill

Infants Born With Intestinal Obstruction And Facing Death Undergo Operations

The skill of an Indianapolis surgeon and modern medical science have given life to two babies otherwise destined to die within a few days of birth.

Both operations are believed to have made medical history as firsts. Under the medical code of ethics, however, the surgeon must remain an unidentified hero.

The two babies were born with obstruction of the small intestine—total closure.

Marita Compton, infant daughter of Dr. and Mrs. George L. Compton, Tipton, Ind., was born Sept. 30 at Elwood, Ind.

Attending physicians immediately were aware the baby did not function normally, and she was rushed to Methodist hospital here for diagnosis.

Damages Asked For Resale of Car

Dealer Charges Breach of Contract

Times State Service

SOUTH BEND, Jan. 9.—A Studebaker automobile dealer today sought damages from a South Bend man for reselling a new car in violation of a contract.

The suit in the home town of the Studebaker automobile was believed the first filed in Indiana to enforce a "fair trade" contract now widely in use to prevent resale of new cars at a profit.

The plaintiff, the Scherman-Schaus-Freeman Co., only Studebaker agency here, demands damages of \$565 from the defendant, A. E. Pauszek.

Seen on Used Car Lot

The suit alleges that the defendant asked for a new car in January, 1946. One was delivered to him Nov. 29, 1947, for which he paid \$2259.

Two days later, firm officials allege, they saw the same car in a South Bend used car lot, although Pauszek signed a nine-month contract agreeing not to sell the car to anyone during the time limit without first offering it for resale to the agency. The contract, the suit alleges, contained a provision that its violation would subject the purchaser to a penalty of one-fourth of the original price of the vehicle.

The car also had passed through the hands of another South Bend used car dealer, the suit alleges.

Traced to Nebraska

Elwood Dalton, general manager of the Studebaker agency, said he has a certificate from the Nebraska license bureau that the car's title on Dec. 8 was held by a Hastings, Neb., dealer.

Frederick K. Baer, attorney for the South Bend-Mishawaka Automotive Trades Association, said the suit was filed to protect the legitimate automobile market and to discourage sale of new cars at prices far above the original price.

He said similar contracts are in effect in every state.

4 Bandits Rob Bank of \$100,000

NEW ORLEANS, Jan. 9 (UP)—

Four bandits forced their way into a mid-city branch bank today and smoothly and expertly stole what officials said might amount to \$100,000.

The bandit foursome operated swiftly after forcing their way into the building as a porter opened the door for early-arriving employees at a branch of the Federal Reserve Bank at 7 a. m. The porter was slugged.

The bandits waited patiently for employees to arrive. They shuttled the women into one closet and the men into another chamber. They waited for tellers to arrive with keys to four money compartments.

Murder Victim Found In River at Gary

GARY, Jan. 9 (UP)—The body of a young woman recovered from the Calumet River was identified today as that of Georgia Cummins, 28, formerly of Madison, Wis., who was shot to death by a jealous suitor last Dec. 2.

A motorman for the South Shore Electric Railroad discovered the body yesterday. It was wedged beneath the trestle a block away from the bridge from which it was thrown by Alex Habeeb, 47, after he shot the girl.

Miss Cummins was shot by Habeeb, a Chicago taxi driver, after a wild ride through downtown Gary. Habeeb was killed by police shortly after he dumped Miss Cummins' body into the river.

Mishawaka Educator Heads K-C Schools

KANSAS CITY, Mo., Jan. 9 (UP)—

Dr. Harold E. Moore of Mishawaka, Ind., newly elected superintendent of Kansas City schools, will assume his position here Feb. 1 or 15, Butler Disman, president of the Board of Education, announced today.

Mr. Disman said a contract calling for \$14,000 a year the first year and a half and \$15,000 the next two years will be mailed to Dr. Moore next week.

Dr. Moore will replace Dr. Herold C. Hunt, who resigned to become superintendent of schools in Chicago.

Congress—GOP Trains Guns On Truman Plan

WASHINGTON, Jan. 9 (UP)—The Republican leadership in Congress trained its big guns today on the cost of President Truman's new legislative program.

The GOP charged it would take a budget of \$50 billion and lead to "national bankruptcy."

In their attack on some of the spending policies outlined by Mr. Truman in his state of the union message, GOP leaders found some support in southern Democratic ranks.

Chairman John Taber (R. N. Y.) of the House Appropriations Committee said the administration proposals would "create more inflation, increase prices beyond all control and make a tax reduction impossible."

"Santa Claus' Approach

Chairman Robert A. Taft of the Senate Republican Policy Committee accused the President of taking a "Santa Claus" approach that would inevitably lead to "national bankruptcy."

He estimated that Mr. Truman's program would hike the federal budget by \$10 billion a year.

Case Continued Until Wednesday

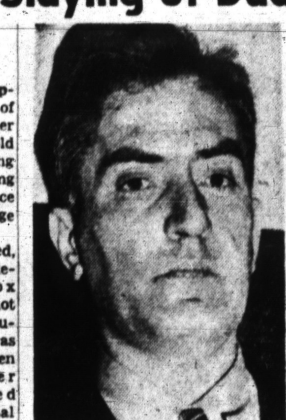
