

# Hope Held Out For Higher Pay To GI Students

Mitchell Assures Evansville Group

WASHINGTON, Jan. 15 — Rep. Edward A. Mitchell, Evansville Republican, predicted today that this session of Congress will pass the House bill increasing subsistence allowances for ex-GI's attending college.

As a member of the House Veterans Committee, Mr. Mitchell voted for the measure when it was reported out last session. It now remains pigeon-holed in the Rules Committee.

"From talks I have had with Majority Leader Charles H. Halleck (R. Ind.), I believe the Rules Committee will bring the bill to the floor and it will be passed," Mr. Mitchell said.

Both Representatives Halleck and Mitchell were visited by two Evansville college students who were here with 80 others from throughout the country pleading for passage of the bill.

Introduced by Meade

The Evansville students who said they represented GI's generally in Indiana colleges, were Paul Niehaus and Paul Couthos. They are for the measure which was introduced by Rep. W. Howes Meade (R. Ky.). It ups subsistence for single students from \$65 to \$75 per month and married veterans with one dependent to \$105 and with more than one, \$120. Married veterans now get a flat \$90.

"While subsistence was raised once before, present prices have wiped out their value so that we must have more or we cannot stay in college and many schools are apt to close," Mr. Niehaus said.

Four students from DePaul University in Chicago claimed they were being both entertained and propagandized here by Communists and they told the House Un-American Activities Committee about it.

Their indoctrination course in what was labeled "operation subsistence" included singing Russian songs and shouting hurrah for Henry Wallace, they said.

100,000 Pre-Addressed Pledge Cards Distributed to Families in Marion County

The cadence for the 1948 Marion County March of Dimes is being set this year by the Indianapolis Fire Department.

Members of the department today began this year's drive to combat infantile paralysis with the distribution of 100,000 pre-addressed pledge cards to Marion County families.

Henry F. Schriker, chairman of the drive, said the distribution of the cards would accomplish a twofold purpose of "obtaining contributions and making every home aware of the importance of the fight against polio."

"Wishing Wells," coin receptacles and a special drive in industrial plants will combine with the pledge-

card plan to aid in reaching the county's goal of \$68,000.

Mrs. Bert C. McCammon, chairman of the women's division of the campaign committee, has announced the mobilization of more than 50,000 women to aid in personal solicitation of funds.

## State Tax Bureau Opens 28 Units

Incomes Over \$1000 Require Returns

The State Gross Income Tax Division has established 28 branch offices here for the distribution of forms for payment of 1947 state income taxes.

Any person whose income last year was more than \$1000 must file a return with payment amounting to 1 per cent of all over \$1000 before the Jan. 31 deadline.

Taxpayers are urged to fill out the blanks and mail them with a check or money order to the Gross Income Tax Division, 141 S. Meridian St. This will avoid standing in line at the main office to pay taxes.

William E. Cox, Stout Field soldier, told police that two men "strong-armed" him at Vermont and Illinois Sts., last night and took \$7.

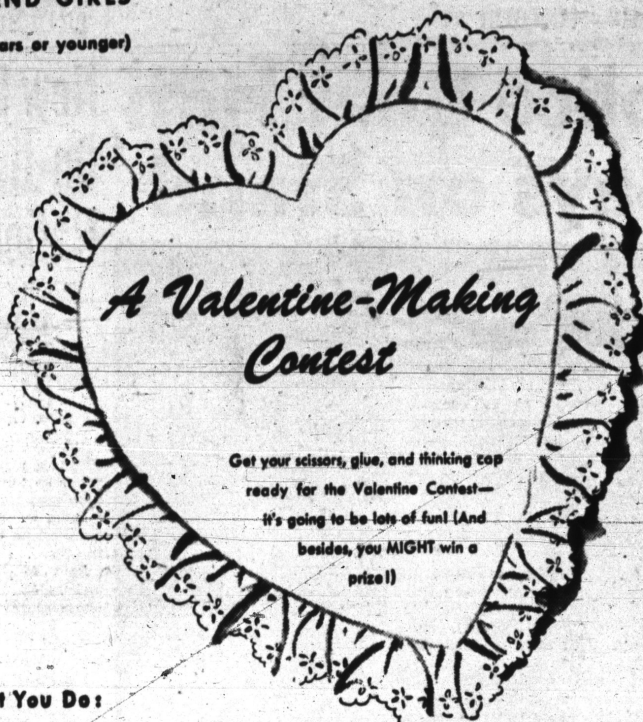
