Taft Asks Bigger Income Tax Cut

PROVIDENCE, R. I., Jan. 16 (UP)—Sen. Robert A. Taft (R., O.) called last night for a \$3 million cut in the Truman administration's budget to provide a "most substantial" income tax cut.

Charging that there "never was a justification for vetoing the tax bill," the Senate majority leader indicated the money could be saved by eliminating duplication in the military budget. Paring public works and chopping \$2,600,000 from the Marshall Plan and overseas occupation costs.

Sen. Taft addressed about 700 members of the Rhode Island Republican Club in the half-empty auditorium.

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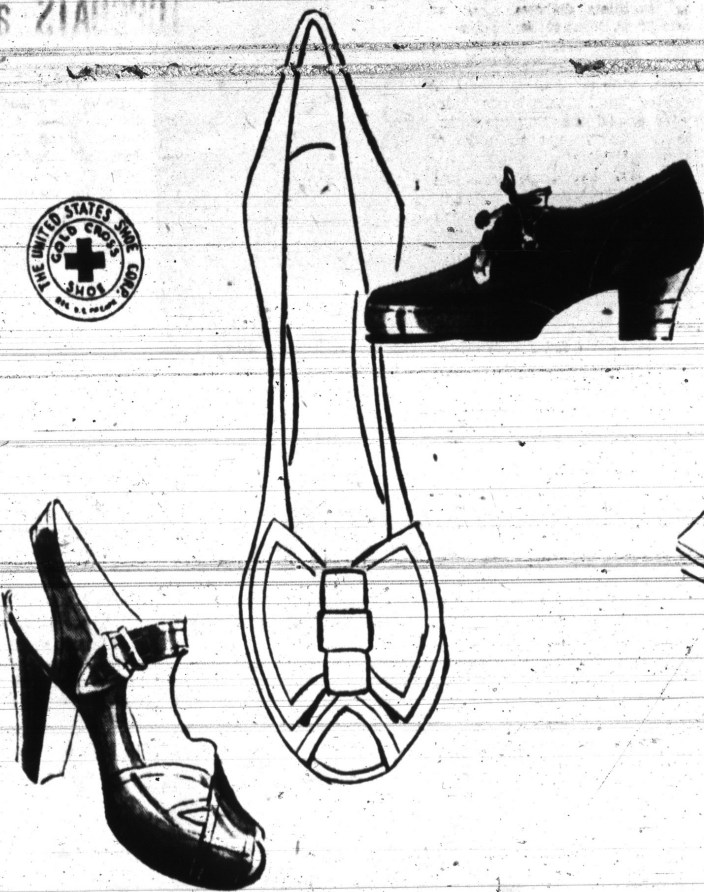
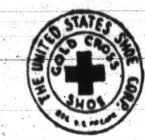
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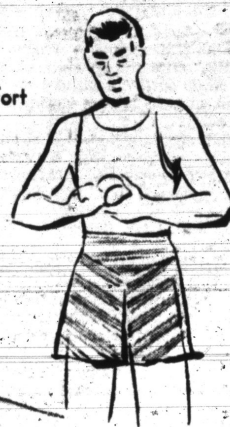
