15 Golden Gloves Bouts Set For Tomorrow

Young Amateurs Seek Chance to Fight In Finals Next Week

First Match Scheduled for 8:15 p. m.; Tickets for Feb. 13 Show Are on Sale

The Indianapolis Golden Gloves today put in the hardest lick of the week as they wound up their heavy training for the tournament's fifth show, the semi-finals, to be held in the Armory, 711 N. Pennsylvania St., tomorrow night.

Out of the 47 boxers still eligible for titles and prizes, 30 are scheduled to see action in the local "punch bowl" tomorrow. The mitt menu calls for 15 bouts; if all lads meet the weight requirements and pass the physical examinations.

After tomorrow's card, The Times-Leader tournament field will be cut to 32 undefeated slambang knuckledusters and they will be paired off in 16 championship bouts on Friday, Feb. 13.

The ring warfare tomorrow will furnish melees in both Open and Novice classes.

Six and Nine As of today, and banking on all boys receiving the green light at the weigh-in, there will be six bouts in the Open class and nine in the Novice, a total of 15 matches, all scheduled over the three two-minute round distance to a decision of the referee and two judges.

Barring any last-minute failure to make weight, there will be two bouts in the Open 118-pound division, two in the 126-pound, and in the 147-pound; and in the Novice class, two in the 112-pound division, two in the 117-pound, two in the 130-pound and one heavyweight match.

All boxers still eligible for tournament competition, the entire list of 47, are requested to report at the Armory tomorrow between 3:00 and 5:30 p. m. for the weigh-in and medical examinations.

Must Receive "Go" Sign The drawings for the night's bouts will be held shortly after all boxers have weighed in and received the "go" sign from the tournament physicians. The pairings will be posted in the Armory dressing quarters along about 7 p. m.

First bout is to get under way at 8:15 p. m. this week and the action will be continuous until all weight divisions have been fought down to the finals for the big show to be held a week from tomorrow.

Reserved seat tickets for tomorrow's show are on sale downtown at Bush-Callahan's, 136 E. Washington St., and the Sportsman's Store.

There will be an added attraction on tomorrow night's Golden Gloves fistic menu at the Armory, something special to entertain the followers of amateur boxing.

Tiny Bland's "Mighty Midgets" from the South Side Community Center, eight or nine little fellows under 10 years of age, are to don the big gloves and engage in an old-fashioned battle royal exhibition.

Last two to remain "upright" will "slug it out" for individual honors in two one-minute rounds. The lads have been trained for the specialty by Coach Bland of South Side.

Finals Show Tickets Tickets for the final night, Feb. 13, are now on sale at the two downtown Golden Gloves agencies. Fans who purchased tickets for all nights during the pre-tournament mail order sale will have first claim on the seat locations they were assigned the first five nights.

Those purchasers may pick up their tickets at the cashier's cage on the first floor of The Times Building. The tickets must be taken up by 5 p. m. next Monday. Those not claimed by that time will go on sale Tuesday morning at Bush-Callahan's and the Sportsman's Store.

The two major Wednesday night leagues burned the alleys once more last night with an even dozen honor counts coming out of the evening's work. Six of the men's 10 high series were rolled in the Indianapolis loop at Pritchett's, while both of the women's honor counts came from the Fox-Hunt Sponcor's Classic.

Taking the evening's laurels was Dutch Holman who scored the second highest three-game tally of the season in the Indianapolis gathering, a 736. His games of 278, 268 and 190 topped by one pin the previous second offering of Gene Zwiener in the American Legion No. 1 League on Jan. 15. It takes second to the scores of Johnny Murphy and Don Johnson, both of whom have 746 pins to their credit. Holman rolls for the Epler's Hardware squad.

Leading the women was Marge Skelton of the Yaver Men's Shop, quietest with 628 toppled timbers. In compiling her seventh honor count of the campaign, Marge rolled games of 188, 212 and 229. Also in the Indianapolis loop, Hershel Griffin totaled a near-700 on games of 246, 236 and 213 for a 695. He rolls for Rowe Landscaping. Erma Perkins tallied a 680 on games of 225, 179 and 276 at Pritchett's.

Other honor counts were turned in by Harry Wheeler, 221-235-221—677, for Marott's Shoes in the Indianapolis League; Wilbur Otting, 223-224-225—672, for Beck-

man's Market in the St. John's group at the Sport Bowl; Bob Kays, 226-192-248—664, for the American Marrettas in the Indianapolis; Ralph Gillespie, 191-217-252—660, in the Diamond Chain League at Delaware; J. Eder, 189-248-222—657, in the Indianapolis; Byron Scaggs, 223-201-232—656, in the Diamond Chain, and Charles Boswell, 238-213-201—652, for the Universal Giants in the Inter-Club League at Pritchett's.

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
