

## Russians Hurl New Charges In Propaganda

British Falsified Denial, Tass Declares

MOSCOW, Feb. 12 (UP)—The Russians struck another blow in the "Battle of Documents" today. They charged the British foreign office with falsifying in denying that a rejected Soviet request to take part in the examination of captured German papers. Barely six weeks after the end of the war in Europe, the Soviet government asked for a part in the study of the Nazi documents, the official Tass news agency said in a dispatch datelined London. After giving its account of the application to join the other Allies, Tass said these facts proved the falsity of a foreign office spokesman's denial Tuesday that it ever turned down such a Soviet proposal.

### Release 'Installment'

(A London foreign office spokesman said Tuesday he could find no trace of any indications Russia ever proposed a joint four-power study of captured German documents. The Tass reference apparently was to the same proceedings at the office's daily press conference.) The Tass report closely followed the release here of the second installment of Russia's counter-blast against the State Department's publication of Nazi-Soviet documents in 1939-41. Great Britain and France tried to use Adolf Hitler as a tool and by appealing him turn his armies loose on Russia, the statement issued by the Soviet Information Bureau said. The Tass report from London said the first Soviet installment had thrown "confusion into English official circles." It reported on the Foreign Office spokesman's assertions as evidence of the confusion.

### Arranges Whitewash

Russia said in the second installment that the United States, by publishing selected documents from the 1939-1941 German foreign office file, tried to whitewash Britain and France for their appeasement policy. "As far back as 1937 it became perfectly clear that a big war was being hatched with the direct connivance of Great Britain and France," the Soviet charge said.

"The fact that the American government undertook to make the German file public while excluding documents pertaining to the Munich agreement shows that the United States government is interested in whitewashing the heroes of the Munich treachery and in putting the blame on the Soviet Union."

The Russians promised that a new installment in the propaganda war of German documents would be published soon.

I'M A SERVICEMAN's wife with a six-months-old baby and my husband will be out of service soon. Can't we find a place to live at a reasonable figure, where my baby will be as welcome as I?

MY HUSBAND AND I have lived apart for over a year. We want a home and a chance to save our marriage before living apart becomes a habit. We have a 10-year-old son. M. V. P.

## Sprinkle Gandhi Ashes in Ganges

3 Million Pilgrims Watch Ceremony

ALLAHABAD, Feb. 12—The ashes of Mohandas Gandhi were consigned to the sacred waters of the Ganges and Jumna rivers today while 3 million Hindu pilgrims watched amid a shower of rose petals from six planes overhead.

According to the Hindu belief, the ceremony was the last step needed to send the soul of India's sainted leader ascending into the halls of Hindu immortals.

Sprinkle Ashes

Gandhi's son, Ramdas, bent across the rail of a white amphibious duck and slowly sprinkled Gandhi's bones and ashes into the river from the brass urn that brought them to the sacred city of Allahabad.

A great roar arose from the throats of Hindus as they watched the ceremony. Pilgrims stood neck deep in the waters and massed in endless ranks upon the sandy slopes of the banks.

Prime Minister Jawaharlal Nehru, Home Minister Sardar V. Patel and Education Minister Maulana Abul Kalam Azad watched from the duck while the ashes were consigned to the river.

Wine Shipment Biggest In California History

## 'She Teased Me'—Youth Slays High School Sweetheart

LOS ANGELES, Feb. 12 (UP)—A 15-year-old schoolboy who "can't get along with anybody" admitted today he killed his high school sweetheart Monday when she teased him about her love for another boy.

Thomas Marsh sobbed out his love for Dolores Conn, 16, as he confessed he shot her in a jealous rage after carrying her books home from school.

"I LOVE HER, I love her," Marsh cried as he collapsed, overcome with emotion, after his confession yesterday. "When she told me about another boy, I blew my top. I pulled the gun out of my pocket and killed her."

"I quarreled with Dolores and everybody else. I can't get along with anybody!"

The boy had left high school to work on his father's ranch. He had been going out with Dolores for a year.

"I know he thought a lot of Dolores," her mother said. "I can't be bitter against anyone who cared so much for her."
