

State Wallace Group Starts 3d Party Move

Plans to Call Convention in June

The Wallace-For-President movement was organized formally in Indiana yesterday as nearly 250 delegates met to set up machinery for a state-wide "third party" in the November presidential election.

The Indiana Citizens-For-Wallace group adopted a resolution giving its executive committee authority to call a state convention to form the People's Progressive party, supporting Henry A. Wallace for President.

Executive Secretary Harry A. White said the convention probably would be held in June, after the proposed national convention of the Wallace third party movement in Chicago.

The Hoosier Wallace supporters went on record favoring a "complete state ticket, including candidates from Governor down to City and County offices," subject to final approval of the executive committee.

Wallace Praised Hoosiers
Dr. J. R. Shannon, Indiana State Teachers College history professor and chairman of the meeting, said the group anticipated "little trouble" in obtaining the required 6642 signatures on petitions required to put Mr. Wallace's name on the state ballot.

Dr. Shannon read a message from Mr. Wallace which praised the Hoosiers for taking steps to formally support his candidacy.

In a keynote address, Dr. Francis D. Wormuth, Indiana University government professor, said "We cannot say whether Wallace will finish first, second or third in the election. But we can say that Mr. Truman will finish either second or third."

Wormuth criticized both major parties for giving voters "no choice on vital issues."

President Truman was condemned by other speakers for "betraying" the policies of Franklin D. Roosevelt.

Temporary officers of the Indiana Citizens for Wallace group were continued in office, with James McGill as honorary chairman.

Dr. Shannon was named chairman, Mr. White secretary and Willard B. Ransom of Indianapolis, treasurer.

Other members of the executive board were Walter Frisbie, Indianapolis, former state CIO executive; secretary, Dr. Frank Newell, Gary; James Nash, Ft. Wayne; Morton Pazol, Muncie; and Charles Wright, Princeton.

Leaders of the group said organization of county chapters would proceed at once. Mr. White said the signatures necessary to put the party on the ballot "probably will be obtained in several of the larger cities."

"What we need is a concentrated doorbell-ringing campaign," he said. "The next three months must be the period of great mass activity by Wallace supporters."

A motion by Carl L. Eddy of Indianapolis, endorsing a "full slate" of state candidates was adopted.

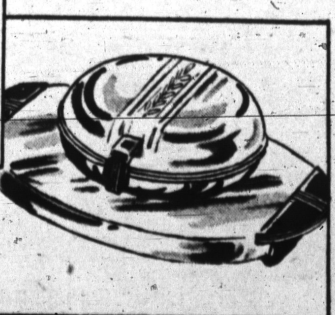
