Men of Otterbein Church Build Banks for Donations

The men of the Otterbein Evangelical United Brethren Church can't claim all the credit even though they are getting the glory for making 200 attractive little church banks for the building fund. While the men worked in Everett Dougherty's basement constructing the banks, women bolstered their morale by serving gallons of steaming coffee and dozens upon dozens of doughnuts.

The feminine contingent also sanded the wood for the little green roofs, glued the white columns on the white churches and frequently did a paint job. In the next two weeks, the church banks will find their way into the homes of the congregation. The silt in the banks will admit coins as large as the silver dollar. It is expected that they will grace the mantel shelf, the top of the radio, the what-not and other conspicuous spots.

Friends of the families, it is hoped, will drop in an offering swelling what the householders give. Every month the banks will be collected, emptied and returned to the members. Their contents will go toward the fund for a church to cost \$100,000.

It will stand on land already owned by the church at Bancroft and E. 31st Sts. The church will be built of Indiana limestone, have an auditorium to seat 300, educational and social rooms and kitchen.

The Home Mission Board of the Evangelical United Brethren denomination will combine forces with the congregation to finance the project. The Rev. Harold D. Shoemaker is pastor.

Presbyterians to Hear Antique Organ Miss Helen Louise Quigg will play hymns on an antique reed organ, pumped by Joe Kline, for the 60th anniversary celebration tomorrow at 10:45 a. m. in the Westminster Presbyterian Church.

Goodwill Industries Chapel Dedication Tomorrow Climaxes 10-Year Dream

MEN AND WOMEN working or living in the industrial center surrounding Senate Ave. and Georgia Sts. will see a 10-year-old dream come true tomorrow.

Then, the new Thompson Memorial Chapel in the Goodwill Industries will open its doors to the public for its dedication ceremonies at 3 p. m.

The worshipful auditorium offers a quiet haven for prayer and services amidst the soot and noise of downtown Indianapolis. In adjoining parts of the building, the industries' handicapped personnel works busily.

IRVING WILLIAMS financed the construction of the chapel as a memorial to his aunt Mrs. Mary Coe Thompson, her husband, the Rev. Lewis O. Thompson, and their son, Sidney Coe Thompson. The entire family has been dead many years.

Various citizens and organizations presented the liturgical furnishings, thus enlisting the interest of the entire community in the use and purpose of the new addition.

Howard Lytle, executive secretary of the Goodwill Industries, has maintained the custom of conducting daily worship for the workers. But there was no suitable place for the services before the chapel was built. Now different ministers of the city will be invited to hold the morning chapel exercise at 8:30 o'clock. Sixteen meetings are scheduled by women's organizations to be held in the chapel.

ON GOOD FRIDAY, the chapel will be open for the three hours—noon to 3 p. m.

Next week, Monday through Friday, the Goodwill Industries will welcome visitors to inspect the chapel. The women's auxiliary will serve as hostesses.

Mr. Williams will make the address of presentation of the chapel tomorrow. Walter Leckrone, editor of the Indianapolis Times, will accept it on behalf of the directors of the industries, and Mrs. Sylvia Denny on behalf of the Goodwill workers. Dr. William C. Hangerling will preach the dedication sermon.

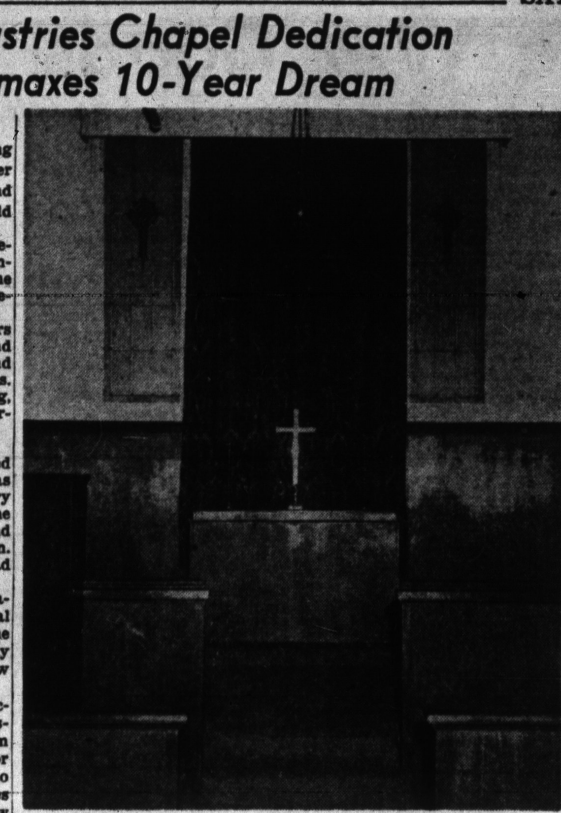
