Tiny Swiss Inn 'Overrun' With Royalty on LooseBy JOHN A. THALE

LAUSANNE, Switzerland, Mar. 3—As a stamping ground for royalty on the loose and sometimes on the lam, Lausanne's Beau Rivage Palace has few rivals.

Among the guests last week at this comparatively small inn on the shores of Lake Leman were listed one king, one ex-king, one pretender, one ex-queen mother, two princesses, one prince, one duchess, four counts, three countesses, and one marchioness.

The management hastens to say that it is a little early in the season yet and things will pick up later on.

Ex-King Michael of Romania, who had been in Switzerland with his fiancee, Princess Anne, was

here until late last week. Busy getting ready for a trip to the United States, he took little part in the social life in these parts.

However, those impressed by close-up views of royalty driving off in a big, new American car, with Princess Anne wedged in the front seat between the ex-king and his mother, the former Queen Mother Helene of Romania.

A number of the dark-eyed, beautiful female members of the royal families of Egypt, Iran and Iraq have visited here. They apparently enjoyed meeting and talking to the vacationing American ladies and usually consented when the CIA extended a hesitant invitation to the waltz.

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FBI Report Clears Condon Of Disloyalty

Investigation Made Nearly Year Ago

WASHINGTON, Mar. 3—The FBI, it was understood today, has found no evidence of personal disloyalty against Dr. Edward U. Condon, noted atomic scientist accused by congressional investigators of associating with Russian spies.

Usually reliable sources said the FBI chief, J. Edgar Hoover, advised Dr. Condon's superiors in the Commerce Department last May that there was no indication of misconduct in his associations. Dr. Condon heads the National Bureau of Standards, an important government research agency.

A spokesman for the House Un-American Activities Subcommittee which investigated Dr. Condon declined to comment on reports that the group had withheld a portion of Mr. Hoover's letter favorable to the scientist. The subcommittee characterized Dr. Condon on Monday as "one of the weakest links" in atomic security, and demanded his removal as director of the Bureau of Standards.

Official Text Withheld

In its report, the subcommittee said it was quoting the FBI director's letter on Dr. Condon only "in part." Rep. John S. Wood (D. Ga.), a member of the three-man group, told reporters the letter was made public just as it was received. A subcommittee investigator "managed to get hold of the letter," Rep. Wood said, and copied it.

Neither the FBI nor the Commerce Department would release a copy of the official text.

The Hoover letter as contained in the subcommittee report said Dr. Condon had been in contact as late as last year "with an individual alleged, by a self-confessed Soviet espionage agent, to have engaged in espionage activities with the Russians in Washington from 1941 to 1944."

However, sources who have seen the FBI letter said it went on to say there nevertheless was no evidence that such association had any character of disloyalty on Dr. Condon's part.

Public Hearings Studied

Meanwhile, the full House Un-American Activities Committee was considering calling public hearings to air its case against Dr. Condon.

Chairman J. Parnell Thomas (R. N. J.) said no final decision will be reached, however, until he can call a meeting of the group. The committee, he said, will go over in detail the charges of the subcommittee.

While Dr. Condon's scientific colleagues rallied to his defense, Robert L. Stripling, chief investigator for the committee, said he expects to serve a subpoena later today to get the Commerce Department's files on Dr. Condon's loyalty investigation.

Acting Secretary of Commerce William C. Foster said the department's loyalty board gave the onetime Princeton professor a clean slate. Mr. Stripling quoted Rep. Thomas as saying he didn't see how it could "in the face of the facts."



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

Probe Chicago Baby's Death After Father Lashes Him

CHICAGO, Mar. 3 (UP)—An autopsy and inquest were ordered today to determine whether a 2½-year-old boy died of natural causes or from a beating which his father admitted giving him to "break him" of wetting the bed.
