Aussies in Strong  
Power RacePut Immigrant Ban  
On Colored Races

BRISBANE, Australia, Mar. 3  
With immigrants now pouring into this country at the rate of 10 Englishmen to one European, observers hereabouts see an empire move afoot to make Anglo-stocked Australia the Pacific's strongest power.

But the long hoped-for welcome mat is still not out for any but white feet and, according to present indications, won't be for many a moon.

Numerous efforts have been made from time to time to get Australians to subscribe to the principle of equality for all peoples and religions. Recently came the strongest—a bid by the eight Protestant church which form the Australian section of the World Council of Churches.

Warning by Churches  
In a blunt reminder that some day 7,500,000 Australians may be challenged over their right to hold an entire continent with a handful of people, the churches warned:

"Australia's immigration policy has become a constant irritant in Pacific and world affairs. We cannot afford to antagonize adjacent peoples with population exceeding ours by fifty-fold."

Apparently, the memory of near Japanese invasion is still too fresh to permit the Australians to change their "white" way of thinking dating back to 1901.

In any case, the average Australian openly declares he wants none of America's "race problems." He firmly believes that the admission of colored peoples would lower his own living standards and create isolated minority groups who would not "merge" into the country's way of life.

"Give us 25 years to build up the population we need," says the government. "Then, maybe, we'll talk about letting in other races,"
