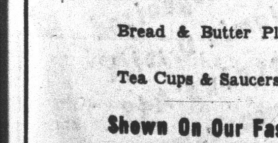

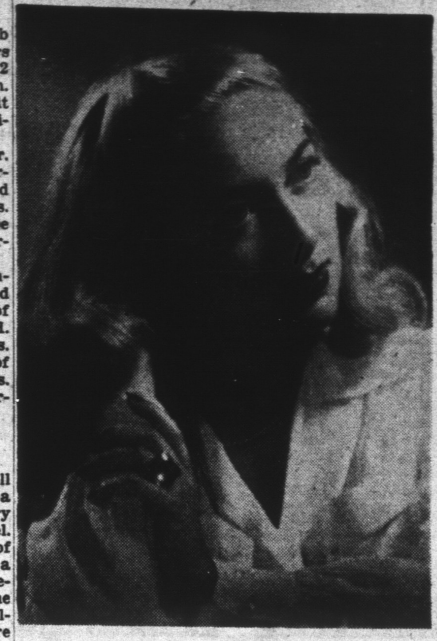

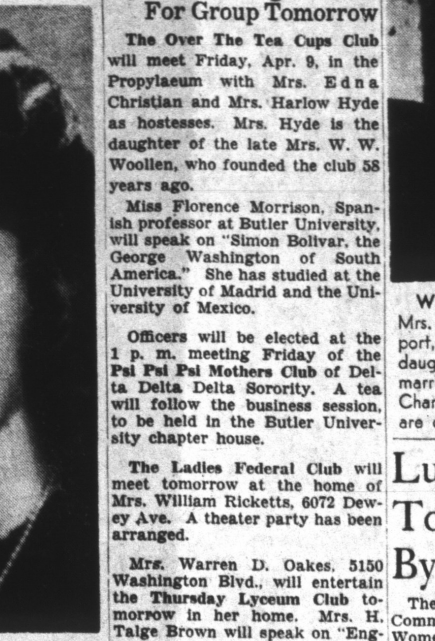

My Day—Party Politics Activity Is Denied

By ELEANOR ROOSEVELT

EN ROUTE TO ENGLAND, Mar. 31—Before I sailed, I was bombarded with questions as to whether I was in agreement with the statements made by my sons, Elliott and Franklin Jr., backing Dwight D. Eisenhower for the Democratic presidential nomination.

And so I think it best to state quite clearly that I am still working with the United Nations and, in that capacity, I work under President Truman and Secretary of State Marshall, and I co-operate with their policies. I am not dabbling in politics. I am not trying to do anything whatsoever in the way of party politics.

MY SONS, as a rule, tell me what they are going to do, but they are grown men and I decided long ago that once children were grown they must be allowed to lead their own lives.

If they feel it right to take a stand of any kind, they must abide by the results of their own decisions. I do not interfere with them now that they are grown to man's estate.

They did not always agree with their father, and when they did not agree, they said so in no uncertain terms. He always preferred to leave them entirely free.

And the most that I can expect of that I desire of them is to be told of their intentions as a matter of courtesy, but I do not expect or desire to control their consciences or their actions.
