Cleanup Drive
To Begin Here
On Apr. 25Youths to Spearhead
Mop, Broom Brigades

Watch your words, John Gunther—Indianapolis is going to clean up.

The first general housecleaning since the author of "Inside USA" labeled the City the "dirtiest in America," will get underway here April 25.

Members of Mayor Al Feeney's "clean-up, paint-up, fix-up committee," met yesterday at City Hall to plan what they hope to be the most successful cleaning campaign in history. Indianapolis boys and girls will spearhead the mop and broom brigades.

"Hard Work" Watchword

Tony Malo street commissioner, told the group the watch-word of the campaign should be "hard work." He declared, "It's been 25 years since Indianapolis won an award for cleanliness and I've found dirt in this town that has been here ever since. We won't get it clean sitting in swivel chairs."

Virgil Stinebaugh, superintendent of public schools, has volunteered to enlist the assistance of teachers and pupils in educational phases of the drive. George L. Brown of the Central Indiana Boy Scout Council, said Scouts would participate.

The new broom interest is expected to reach into every nook and cranny of the city. A concerted street cleaning program, in which Mr. Malo will move all of his equipment into one area at a time, is being planned.

To Survey Vacant Lots

Vacant lots will be surveyed and if unsightly will be reported to the owners and city officials. A city-wide and county-wide grass fire prevention program will be developed.

A special collection of metal scrap, and junk will be made.

Apartment owners and building managers will be asked to survey property and remove unsightly features.

Firemen from district stations will begin making inspections of homes to see that trash has not accumulated to form a fire hazard.

Neighborhood business sections will be urged to dress-up and clean-up. Window displays and advertising will push the campaign. Department stores will be asked to advertise household cleaning items as an incentive to home owners.

To Paint Veteran's Home

As a "kick-off" for the campaign the committee plans to paint a crippled veteran's home which will be painted and spruced up by volunteer labor.

To further encourage city pride the committee plans a clean-up parade of city equipment, fire apparatus, and garden club floats. The parade will be directed by the Junior Chamber of Commerce.

Members of the committee ask that every home and building be cleaned from attic to basement, and that every yard, alley and street be renovated. Adults will be charged with the heavier tasks but boys and girls are expected to perform the lighter work.
