

McClain, Dog Resume Brown County Safari

Trapper Believes 'Guaranteed' Cat-Hound Will Stay on Scent Until Beast Drops

NEW BELLSVILLE, Ind., Apr. 5.—The big hunt is on again. Harry McClain, big game hunter of 20 years' experience, took to Brown County hills and hollows today with a "guaranteed" cat-hound from Alma, Ark.

"This time I'll get whatever critter is scaring people around here," the intrepid 66-year-old trapper said. "I figure it won't take more than six to eight days now to finish the hunt."

Hunts Monster
The Indianapolis hunter seeks to track down a mysterious monster which has been reported in this area for several years. In recent months a number of persons have said they have seen or heard the beast.

Today he gave his trained cat-hound the first chance to tug at the leash. He purchased the four-year-old dog from W. B. Caraway, who maintains a breeding and training kennel in Arkansas.

"All the lures, traps and cat whistles I used before did no good. But a cat isn't going to fool a good cat hound," the grizzled hunter said.

Bill Tracks Cats
"Bill, that's the hound's name, is trained to track cats and nothing else. He won't go off chasing rabbits. Once he gets the scent and starts tugging, I'll let him loose. Then all I have to do is follow."

"He'll stay on the scent until the cat drops or is cornered."

Mr. McClain, who believes the beast is a family of mountain lions, hunted his quarry for three weeks until the last snow melted. County gossip substantiates his belief.

Years ago a pair of mountain lions were brought to the county as pets. When they grew too large to keep, they reportedly were turned loose.

Hunter McClain abandoned his winter hunt because it was too

difficult to trail the animals without snow. He reported seeing them several times, however, and fired several ineffective shots with his 30-30 caliber Winchester.

The hunter and his dog arrived here Saturday to resume hunt headquarters at the home of Mr. and Mrs. L. J. Moore.

Over the week end, Mr. McClain let the hound rest from his Arkansas trip and get acquainted with the strange countryside.

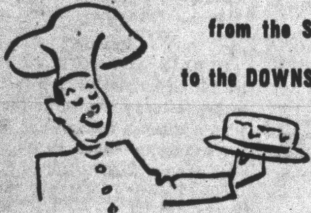
He is good to me and shows me a good time, but I want a home of my own. Should I continue to go with him for a good time or forget him?

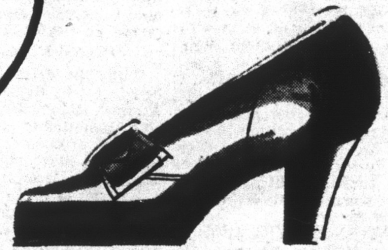
