Rites Set Monday

Equipment Firm Executive Was 44

Services for Glenn P. Holcomb will be held at 10:30 a. m. Monday in the Flanner & Buchanan mortuary and burial will be in Crown Hill.

Mr. Holcomb, who was vice president of the Indiana Highway Material and Equipment Association, died last night in General Hospital. He was 44 and lived at 411 Buckingham Dr.

A native of Bay City, Mich., Mr. Holcomb lived most of his life in Indianapolis. He attended Wisconsin University and was a member of the Baptist Church and the Indianapolis Athletic Club.

Survivors are his wife, Mrs. Hannah H. Holcomb; a son, James Arthur Holcomb; a daughter, Miss Glenda Elaine Holcomb; his mother, Mrs. Albert Palmer Holcomb, all of Indianapolis; a sister, Miss Dorothy Holcomb, Milwaukee, Wis., and a brother, Lt. John K. Holcomb, Annapolis, Md.

Move Swiftly After College Trustees Vote To Withdraw Church's Financial Support

Episcopal laymen, interested in seeing their church continue the operation of Canterbury College in Danville, expect to open a fund-raising campaign for the college the first of the week.

The laymen moved swiftly after the college board of trustees this week voted to withdraw the church's support from the college.

The laymen, headed by Schuyler C. Mowrer, official of Allison Division of General Motors, are organizing the Canterbury Foundation which will raise money on a loan basis with U. S. savings bonds as collateral.

The Episcopal Church took control of the college two years ago by placing a majority of members on the board of trustees. Trustees voting to withdraw the church's control, said there was lack of financial support from the church.

Other sponsors of the foundation plan are Lyman B. Whitaker, Willis Conner Jr. and George Howe, Indianapolis; Irving Baldwin, Ft. Wayne, and Donald B. Smith, Kokomo.

The laymen assume that if the college trustees are shown evidence of financial backing they will reconsider their vote to withdraw church control.

Dr. Edgar C. Cummings, college president, yesterday issued a statement explaining the trustees' action.

College feel with a deep sense of regret that economic factors have forced them to withdraw Episcopal college sponsorship.

The statement was authorized by the Rt. Rev. Reginald Mallett, bishop of the Northern Indiana Episcopal Diocese.

At the same time, Dr. Cummings announced he will accept the position of dean of DePauw University effective Sept. 1. He became president of the college in March, 1946, while it was Central Normal College.

Prior to that he was assistant to the director of Indiana University Extension Division and a member of the University of Rochester faculty. During World War II he served in the Navy.

At DePauw he will succeed Dean Edward R. Bartlett, who became president of Iliff School of Theology at Denver, Colo., last summer. Dr. George B. Manhart of the DePauw history department has been acting dean since that time.

Shinto Goodby Gives Yank Extra 'Bride'

Already Married, Though Estranged, San Franciscan Has 'Marriage' Annulled

SAN FRANCISCO, Apr. 9 (UP)—Frederick T. Ebersole, a former Navy commander who said he unwittingly went through a Shinto wedding ceremony with a red-haired Army intelligence assistant while stationed in Tokyo, had the "marriage" annulled today.

Mr. Ebersole, 34, a San Francisco chain store executive, said that about a month ago his "bride," Elizabeth Church, 28, Seattle, had a scroll given her at the ceremony translated. It was a Shinto marriage certificate.

"Miss Church told me she wanted her name cleared, so I went to a lawyer and had the 'marriage' annulled," Mr. Ebersole explained.

Mr. Ebersole, who has a wife and three children, said he and Miss Church became interested in Shinto customs while in Japan. He was separated from his wife at the time, he said. His wife later obtained a divorce but they have been reconciled since the war.

Mr. Ebersole said he and Miss Church then returned to the United States shortly afterward. Mr. Ebersole's wife said she would accept his explanation.

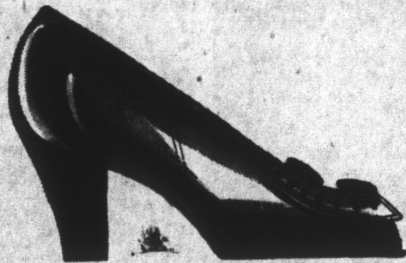
Arrange Services For W. H. Teaney

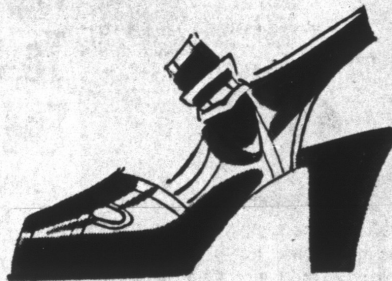
