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**Snub at Bogota Stuns U. S. Group**
**Silence Greets Offer of Loans**

BOGOTA, Colombia, Apr. 9 (UPI)—A serious diplomatic crisis existed for the United States delegation to the ninth Inter-American Conference today as a result of a collective snub last night by delegates of the other 20 American republics.

Delegates sat quietly while the statement was read. They did not applaud when it was finished. There was absolute silence, not even the rustle of paper.

Americans Stunned  
Mr. Marshall and his colleagues, expecting an outburst of applause, obviously were stunned by the Latin American reaction. Veteran observers said they never had seen anything like it—there was not even polite diplomatic applause.

There was general agreement that the United States had received a considerable blow to its prestige by the diplomatic rebuff.

Veterans attributed the Latin American reaction to the tactics used in making the announcement, to the so-called "coldness" of the U. S. delegation, and to the fact that the Latin American countries came to the conference hoping for a Western Hemisphere "Marshall Plan."

Miss Tierney obtained an interlocutory divorce decree 13 months ago but when the year's waiting period expired Mar. 10, she failed to file for her final divorce. Today she said they were reconciled last month and as a result she decided not to get the divorce.

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**U. S. Joins in Air Cadet Exchange Plan**

OTTAWA, Apr. 9 (UPI)—The United States has joined Canada and England in an international exchange of air cadets this summer, the Air Cadet League of Canada announced today.

The league said the United States participation in the plan was approved by Maj. Gen. Lucas V. Beau of the U. S. Civil Air Patrol. Canada plans to exchange 50 cadets with England.
